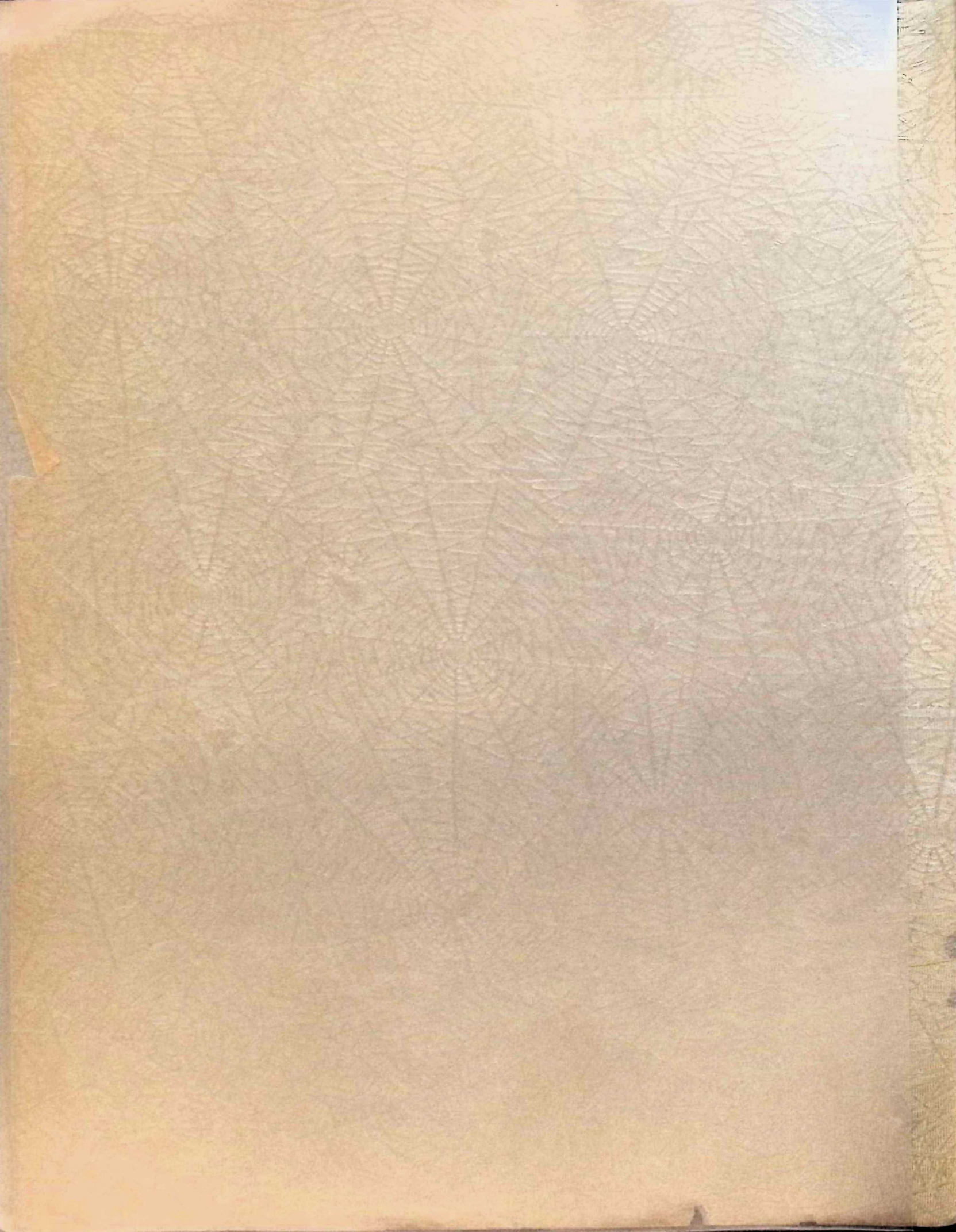

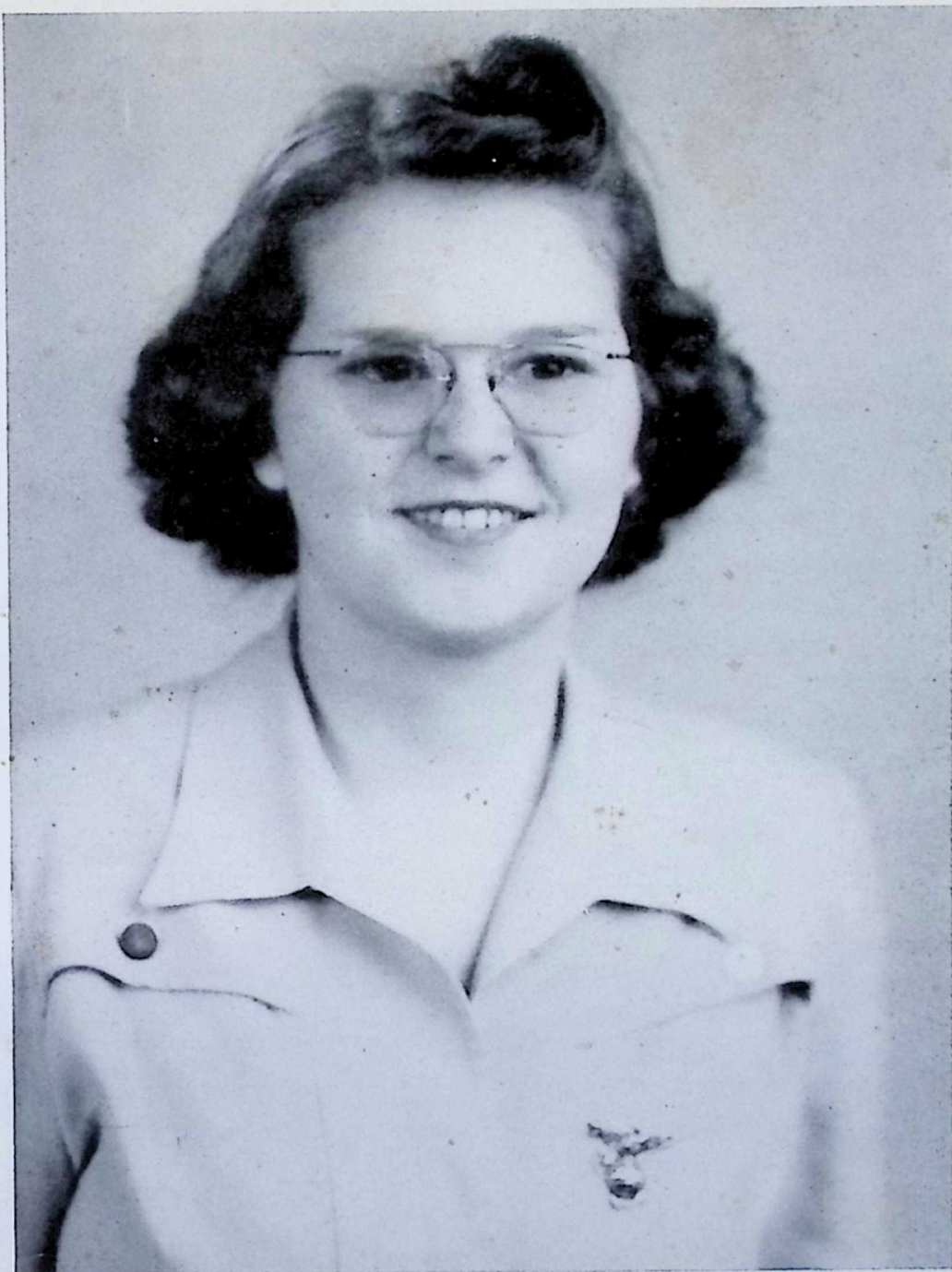

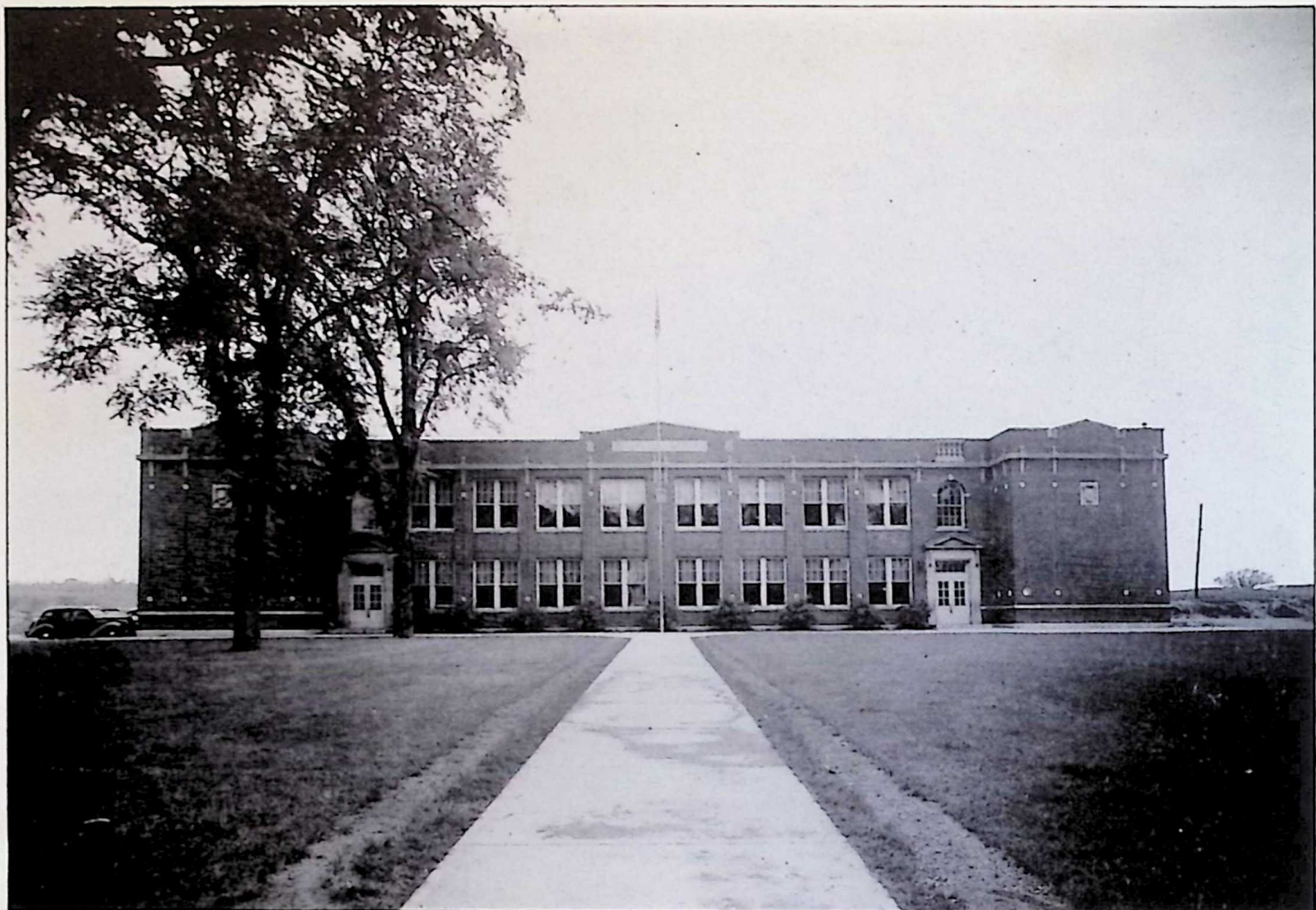

# History of the Class of 1943

The members of the class of '43 entered Stillwater School in September, 1930. Our first grade teacher was Miss Boyd.

We finished eighth grade in 1939, and our class started in High School. Miss Sorenson was our Freshman advisor, as well as the Commercial teacher. Mr. Roberts was our science teacher. Miss Tilly taught languages and Introduction to business. Mr. Palmatier was History and English IV instructor. Mr. Reed was the gym teacher, coach, and chemistry teacher. September, 1942, we started our Senior year at S. H. S. Our class of thirty-nine students has diminished to thirteen. James Bochetti left for the Army Air Force in November. He will receive his diploma. John Moore left for the Army in March. He had the opportunity of having his graduation exercises. Another important activity of our Senior year was the sponsoring of the Victory Minstrel Show. We have four more students added to our class: Raymond Nelson, Richard Moore, Walter Hewitt, and Basil Walker. We also have two new faculty members: Miss Maloy replaced Miss Cornish, Miss Reagan replaced Mr. Granger.

Now we have finished our four years of High School and find that we are both happy and regretful at the thought of leaving. We are happy that we have been successful in attaining our goal—graduation, but we regret leaving the place which has given us so many happy memories. Now we say good-bye to school days and good luck to the classes that will follow us.

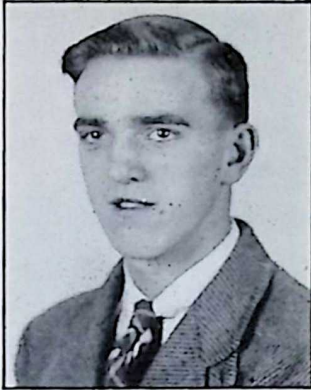

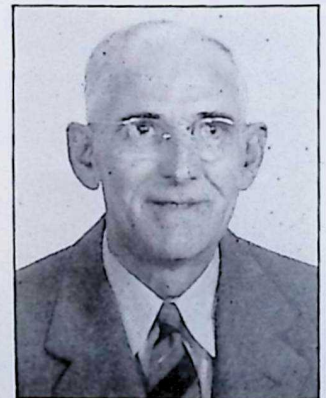

I sincerely hope you will remember me for some time. If you do, think not of me as "The Grouch" or "Simon Says", but think of me as, "One who tried to help you in at least one single way to be better fitted for the life you have to live". Above all, always keep in mind: "When you work, work hard, and when you play, play hard".

FRANCES "IRISH" TANNER—Just sitting at home staring at her High School diploma wondering if its real or just a mirage.

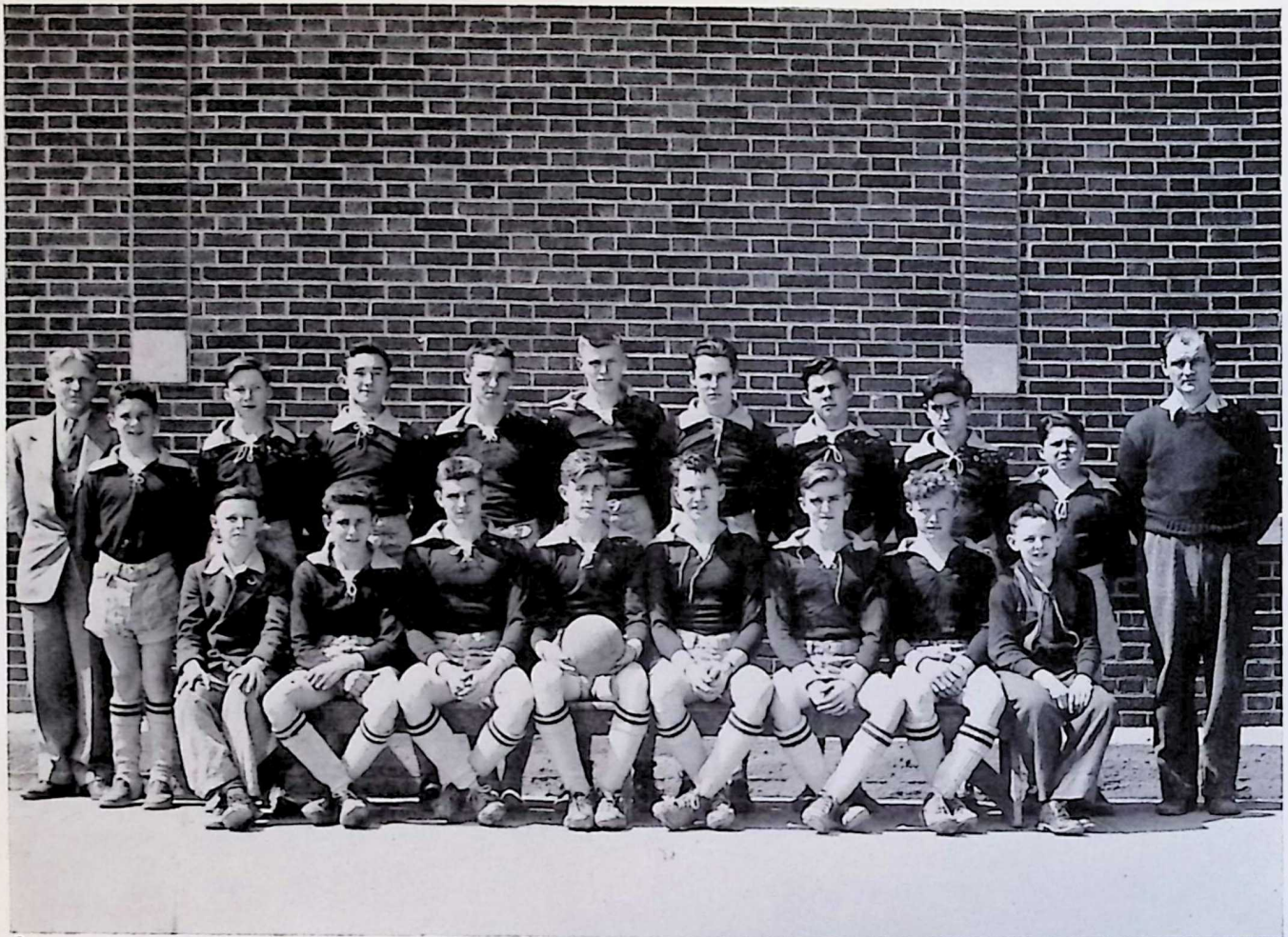
EDITH WAGONER—Edie couldn't get use to life without school so she is now attending Teachers College.

## Soccer

When Coach "Deac" Whitman called the first practice for soccer on September 15, about twenty boys reported. Coach Whitman saw among them three first string veterans of last year's championship team: Jim Bochetti, John Moore and John Ward. Merrill Baker, Dick Moore and Basil Walker were also present. Although hampered by rainy weather and a muddy field which slowed up practice, Coach Whitman had rounded out a pretty confident team by the time the opening day rolled around. On October 6, Stillwater High ventured to South Glens Falls for its opening game. South High had a much bigger team than Stillwater, but Stillwater was faster, which proved to be the better advantage. Stillwater emerged with a 2-0 victory after a very thrilling game. Stillwater played host to the Luzerne squad on October 13, for the second game of the season. This game proved to be too much an opposition for the younger Stillwater Squad, with Stillwater bowing to Luzerne 2-0. Losing to Luzerne made the Stillwater boys even more determined to win the next game which was to be played at Burnt Hills. Burnt Hills had a team far different than the team last year was, as they proved when the league got under way. Coach Reid had a team with a lot of fight and a determined will not to end this season as it had previous years, at the bottom of the league standing. In the game between Stillwater High and Burnt Hills there was plenty of rough play plus a little argument over whether Stillwater had scored or not in a pile up in front of the Stillwater goal. From the minute the first whistle blew to the final moment of the game both teams were out to win, with several attempts from both teams to score. The game ended in a 0-0 tie after a hard and vigorous struggle. Stillwater was the only team which wasn't beaten by the winners of the league, which was Burnt Hills. On October 22, Stillwater played host to a very bitter rival of theirs, Schuylerville. This game was the toughest and most thrilling of the season. Although there wasn't any scoring the first half, both teams had their chances of driving one through, but somehow couldn't. The field was very muddy and it was a drizzling rain which made it all the worse. The third quarter started off like the first two but near the end of the quarter Schuylerville drove one through. This being the only goal made in the game, it gave Schuylerville the game 1-0. Due to the war restrictions only four teams entered in the soccer league. Ballston and Corinth were absent because of the lack of transportation.

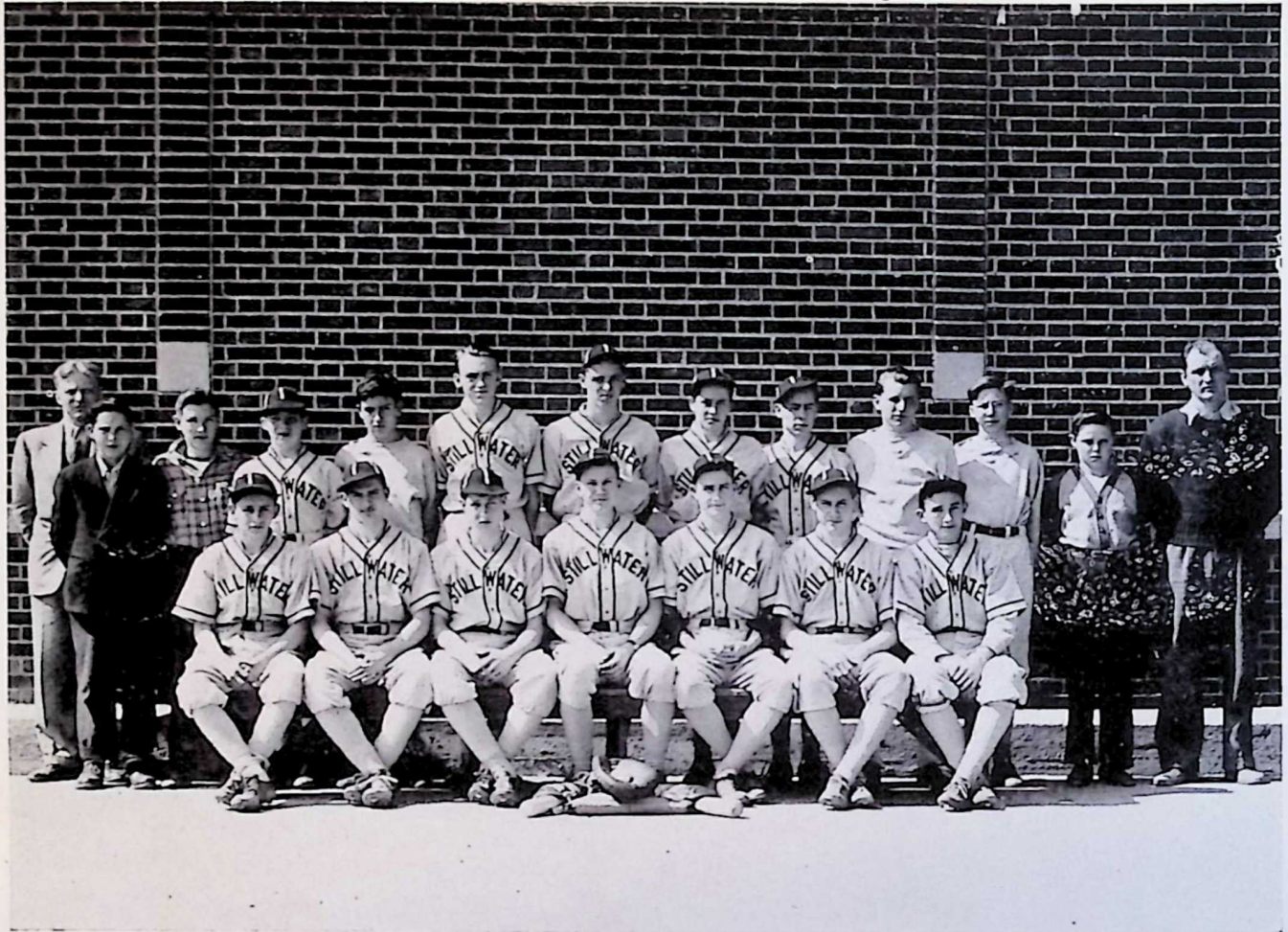
# Basketball

On November 15, Coach "Deac" Whitman called the first basketball practice. Of the twenty-three boys who reported there was only one veteran, John Moore back from last year's varsity team and Merrill Baker, Basil Walker and Dick Moore who played with the junior varsity. The remainder of the squad was made up of Freshmen and Sophomores. The first game was at Hoosick Falls, where the team had a chance to show off their new suits, which looked pretty nifty. The Stillwater boys showed they were green and had yet to learn what it was all about. The following week they opened up their first league game with Schuylerville. This game was played at Stillwater. The Stillwater squad put up a very fine defensive game and at the end of the final period the score was tied. The teams played two over-time periods. The first period neither team scored, but in the second period Fitzgerald of the Schuylerville five came thru with a one hander which gave Schuylerville the game.

As the season went by it looked as though Stillwater wasn't going to win any games. They would play a good game the first two or three quarters and then they seemed to stand still. Stillwater just couldn't get over that little barrier which stood between them and winning a game. On March 3, Stillwater played host to Greenwich.

With just five seconds to go the score stood 26-28 in favor of Stillwater, when Burns of the Greenwich squad got hold of the ball and threw it three-quarters of the length of the floor for a basket. 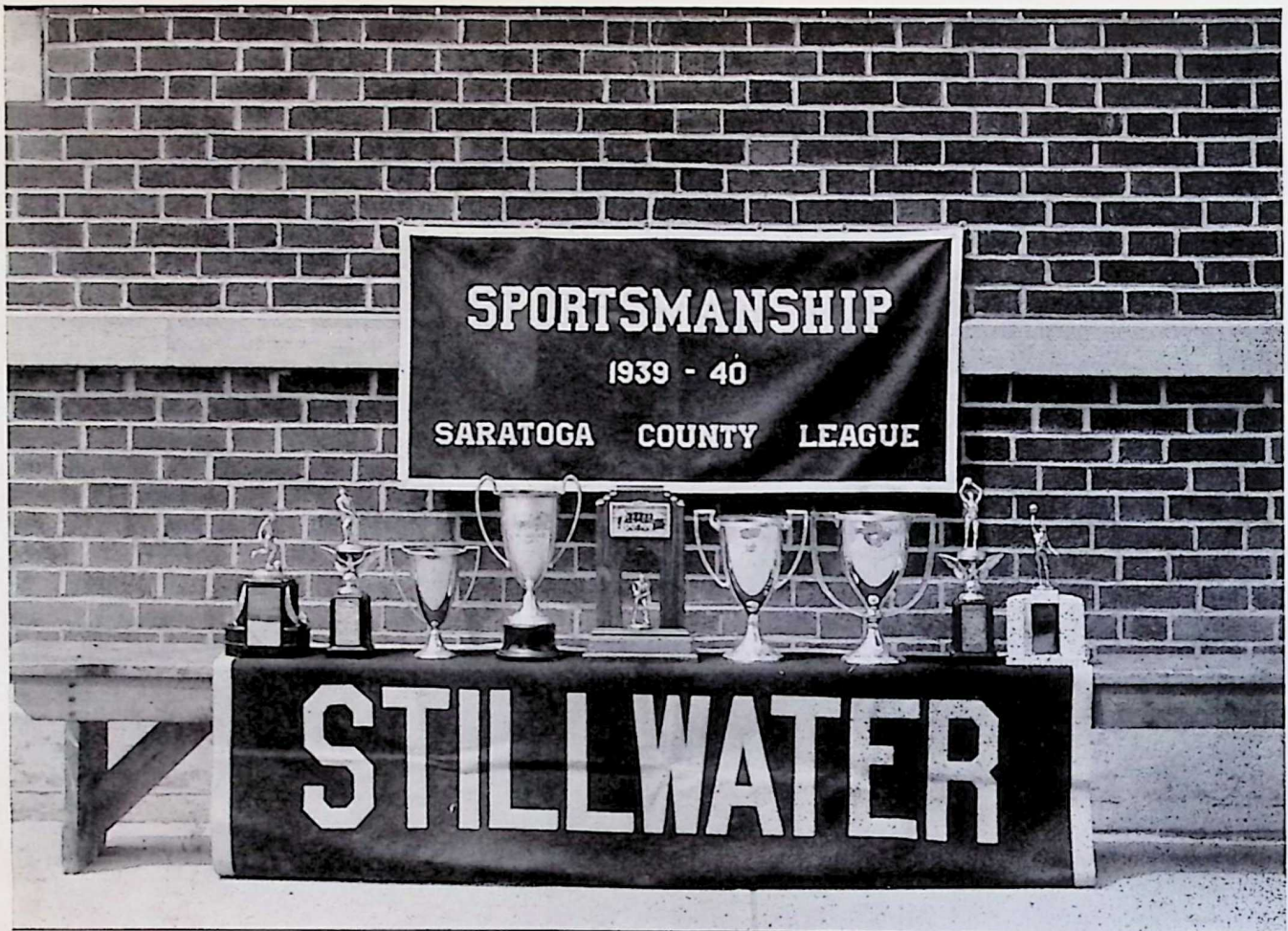
## Baseball

Due to the war restrictions, Stillwater High has been forced to play teams above their class. Stillwater is a class D school and Mechanieville and Saratoga are class B schools.

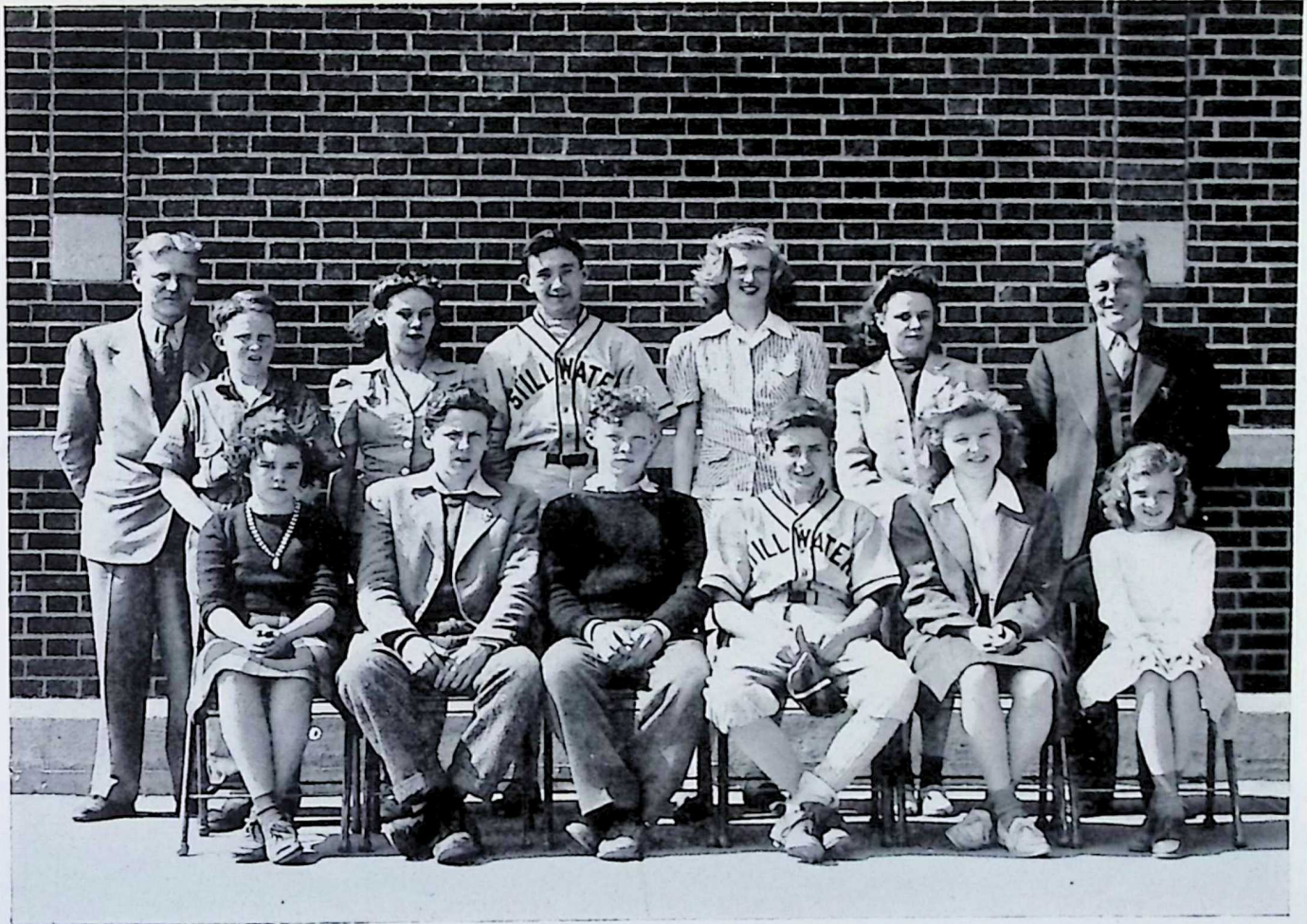




## Trophies
