With due honor and respect, we, the Seniors of 1944 dedicate this page to Thomas Osmond, Editor-in-Chief of the Year Book of 1943.

After graduation last June, Tom enlisted in the Navy, and in October he made the supreme sacrifice—giving his life for his country.

With a deep sense of pride we accepted the flag that accompanied Tom home, and have it on display to keep us ever mindful that we must be worthy of his sacrifice.

History of the Class of 1944

On behalf of the class of 1944, I submit this our history, to those who are interested.

Our class entered the Stillwater School in September, 1932. Miss Grace Boyd was our first grade teacher. After eight years of hard studying we finally received our diplomas from the eighth grade which permitted us to enter the long dreamed of Freshman Class.

Miss Sorenson was our Freshman advisor, and this year was uneventful except for our General Science class making a trip to Troy with Mr. Granger. There we visited the Troy Record Building and Wagars Ice Cream Plant.

Mr. Granger was our Sophomore home room teacher. This year we felt more settled in high school life. Most of our boys made the first team of the Junior Varsity basketball team, and four of our girls were on the Junior Varsity Cheerleading Squad.

We started our Junior year with Mrs. Nolan as class advisor, but in January she was replaced by Mrs. Sauerbrey. The most important event of this year was that we received our class rings. Another important event was the Junior Prom. Charlie Randall and his orchestra played and the dance was a huge success. When the Victory Minstrel Show was held, a good share of our class helped to make it a success.

We started our Senior year in September, 1943, with Miss Bennison as our home room teacher. The most important activity of this year was our very successful New York City Trip. We were in New York from April 17 to the 20. Some of the things of interest that we saw were: the Museum of Natural History, Radio City Music Hall, Bronx Zoo, and the Statue of Liberty, along with many shows.

We chose Navy Blue and Gold for our class colors and the Jonquil for our flower. Our motto is "Out of school life into life's school."

Now that we have finished four years of high school we are both sad and glad at the thought of leaving our dear old Alma Mater.

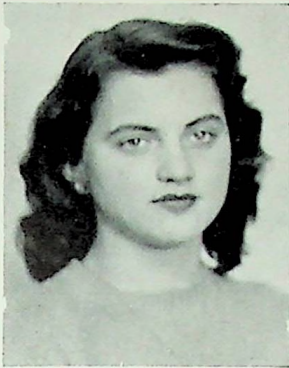

And studies all the harder.

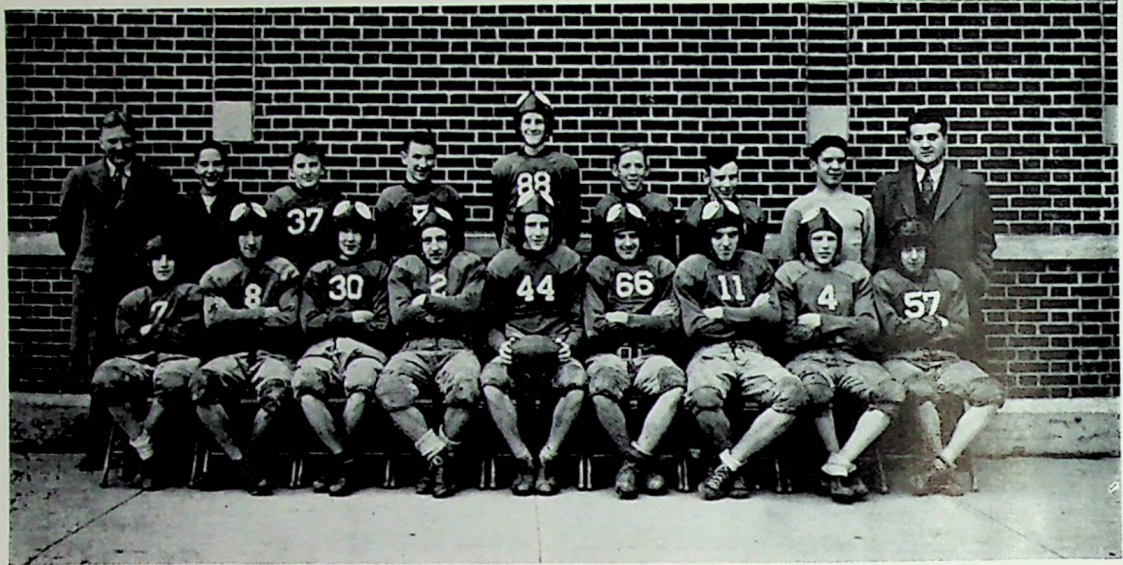
Shirley Smith has her work all planned,

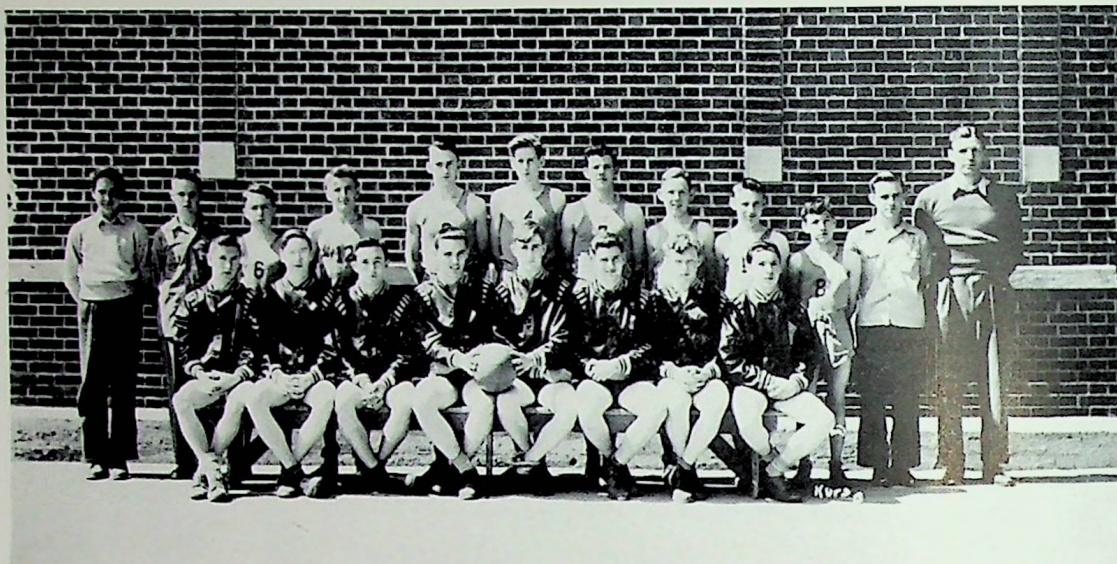
Football

We had five games during the season and, though losing them all, profited much, and S.H.S. is waiting for revenge. Our five subduers were Ballston, Greenwich, South Glens Falls, Hoosick Falls, and Salem, the final Champions.

Basketball

On November 9th Coach Frank Cinella called for candidates for basketball. About twenty-five boys reported for both Junior Varsity and Varsity clubs. Returning to the varsity from last year's team were Harold Lake, Lou Bailey, Mert Baker, and Joe Hanchan. This year all but Luzerne and Corinth, were back in the Saratoga County League. We practiced for three weeks at blocking, shooting, pivoting, scrimmaging a great deal, and we were ready for the league. Our first league game we dropped by a small margin to the Reidman of Burnt Hills. The following week after hard practice, we toppled G.H.S. by one point. The same week we lost to a fast scrappy team from McVile, one of our oldest rivals. During the Christmas vacation Coach Cinella answered Uncle Sam's call and left for service Dec. 31. From there on through we were under Coach Jim Brooking, a local fellow. Under Jim we started off great, "knocking off" Ballston, and Schuylerville in two consecutive games. Then South High downed us with the advantage of great height. In the second half of the season the B.H.B.L. squad felled us again, much to our sorrow. We felled Greenwich again on their own court by a greater margin than before. The following week we trampled Ballston again and sent them home with heads bowed. Following this game we had our hearts set on second place, but then came the greatest upset of the year. We were defeated by Schuylerville a team we had thoroughly demolished in the earlier part of the season. The last league game of the year was one of the best (according to Coach Brooking) played on the S.H.S. court in a long time. We were host to the final champs, South High. We led the victors 19-15 at half time; the first time this year South High had been headed. However their great height finally defeated us by a 35-26 margin. Throughout the entire year we stood as follows: We were defeated both times by B.H.B.L., defeated G.H.S. twice, defeated twice by McVile, defeated Ballston twice, and split honors with Schuylerville. We were also defeated twice by South High, split honors with St. Peter's of Saratoga, and defeated Waterford twice. Total for season: 8 wins, 8 losses.

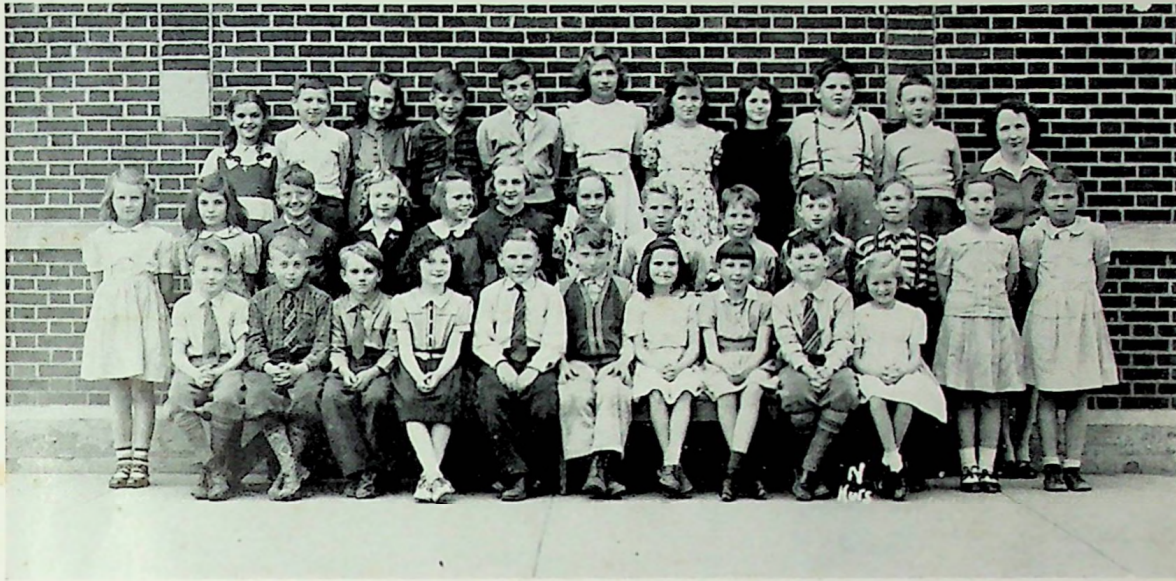
