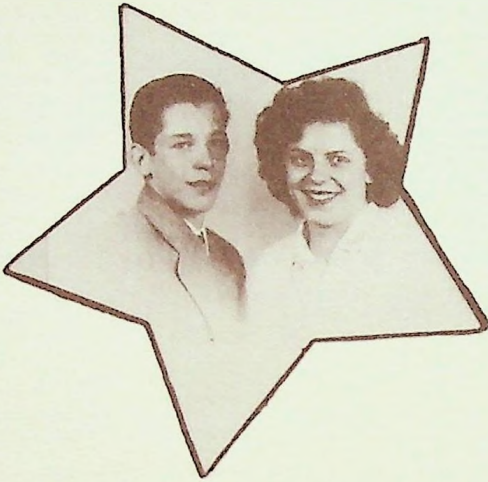

# History

On a bright September morning in 1936, the present Seniors of S.H.S. enrolled in regular day classes in the Stillwater Grade School. Our first grade teacher was Miss Anastasia Dunnigan (now Mrs. Art Mahar). We mastered the principles of learning very rapidly and most of us knew that 2 plus 2 makes 6-whoops-I mean 4. The highlights of our first year concluded with our actions in various plays produced by the grade faculty. In the first grade also, our artistic aspirations knew no bounds and the walls of our classroom frequently had to have a new paint job.

In the second grade, our benevolent teacher was Miss Eulalia Fuller. In this grade some of our number became fascinated with the cattails that grew behind the school and in one corner of our classroom we had quite an assortment of them. We learned all about the Eskimos and their customs; we acted in various plays; and we even put on a three ring circus.

Our third grade teacher was Miss Marguerite Stephens (now Mrs. James Hutton). That year we learned of the English language for the first time and most of us mastered the pitfalls of this all-too-necessary language.

In our fourth year our instructor was Mrs. Bessie Mohan; and for the first time in school we had slides in the class room. Many of us became interested in them and the only time we were quiet was during that time they were being shown.

We again met Miss Dunnigan in the fifth grade and began a new group of plays and comedies; the best of which was the play about the Indians in which many of us participated.

We were in sixth grade when the First War Bond drives began and our teacher, Mrs. Louise Darrow, in order to stimulate the purchasing of such bonds and stamps, organized us as soldiers, with commands going to those who had bought the largest amount of these bonds and stamps.

During our three years in Junior High School -- seventh, eighth, and ninth grades -- our English teacher was Mrs. Dorothy Flanigan; Math -- Mr. George DeWein, Mrs. Wealthea Saurbrey, and Mr. Nelson Arlin; Science -- Miss Eleanor Regan, Mr. Malcolm Borst; Social Studies -- Mr. George DeWein, Mrs. Dorothy Flanigan, Mr. Joseph Rowland; Music -- Miss Vera Ashley, Mr. Frank Alexik; Gym -- Mr. Truman Whitman, Mr. James Brooking; Commerce -- Miss Anne Bennison; and Language -- Mrs. Wealthea Saurbrey.

In seventh grade, we learned how it would feel to be in high school, as we had several teachers and many varied activities. We learned however that this also meant more homework, so we weren't so pleased with our new advancement. During this year, many of us became increasingly interested in sports, especially basketball.

In the eighth grade we developed talent for basketball and baseball, started our own teams, and won many of our games. We finally graduated from the eighth grade in June and entered high school the following year.

During our Freshman year we had many activities, including our Freshman Dance. In our General Science class, which many of us found very interesting, we sponsored such varied projects as the construction of electric motors, communications equipment, and many other types of scientific apparatus.

During our three years in Senior High School our teachers were: Science -- Mr. Borst; Math -- Mr. Armlin, Mrs. Barringer; Languages -- Mrs. Connors, Mr. Dalton; Social Studies -- Mrs. Hillman, Mr. Cinella, Mr. Barringer; Commercial -- Miss Harrington, Miss Powers, Miss Rourke; Gym -- Mr. Hoffa; Music -- Mr. Alexik.

During our Sophomore year, we sponsored many activities in order to raise money for the trip to New York which is taken in the Senior year. We especially enjoyed our gym classes and some of us developed unusually good capacities in the field of sports.

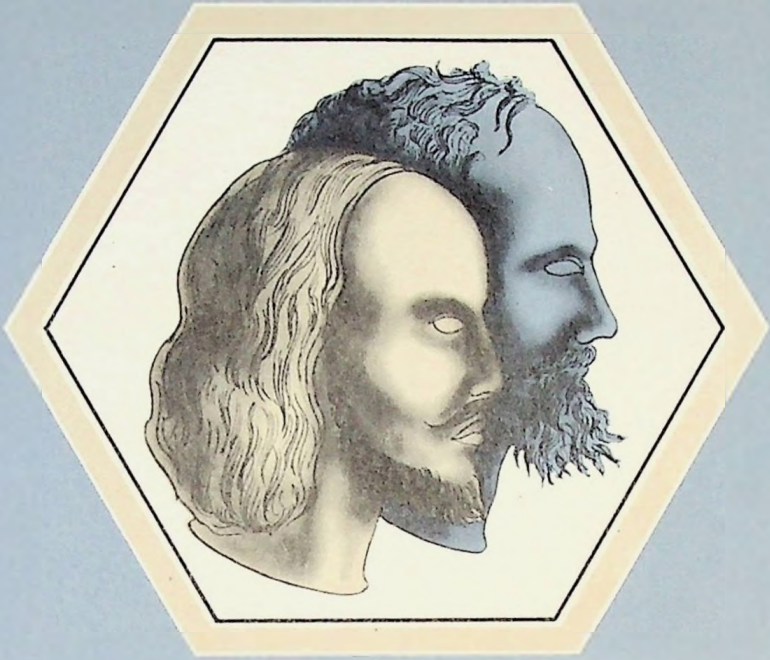
In our Junior year we continued to develop various talents in fields of our interests. We sponsored a Junior Dance, and several booths at the other dances, by which means we were able to obtain quite a bit of money.

At last we attained the most fruitful of all our years in school: our Senior year. Our activity this year consisted mainly of projects to earn the necessary money for our New York trip. These projects included a baked ham supper, a public card party, a three-act play, a dance, and selling magazine subscriptions and Christmas cards. By dint of much work and worry, at long last, Easter vacation and our trip were at hand. We left for New York, March 29, returning four days later. While in the big city, we visited the Museum of History and Art, the famous Ice Show, the Easter pageant at the Music Hall, three radio programs and all the well-known sights in general. Everyone had a grand time notwithstanding the tired and aching limbs, sore feet and general exhaustion that prevailed at the end. We were accompanied on our trip by Mr. Borst, Miss Rourke, and Mr. Layne.

And thus, rather nostalgically at this point, we must conclude this account of the history our class has made to date. The history of the class of '48 is not finished however. We are merely beginning that long and busy voyage which will take us the rest of our lives to complete. On this threshold of our lives, we feel somewhat as did Tennyson's hero, Ulysses, when he said:

"There lies the port; the vessel puffs her sail  
    . . . . .  
Some work of noble note may yet be done.  
    . . . . .  
. . . . . We are . . . . . strong in will  
To strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield."

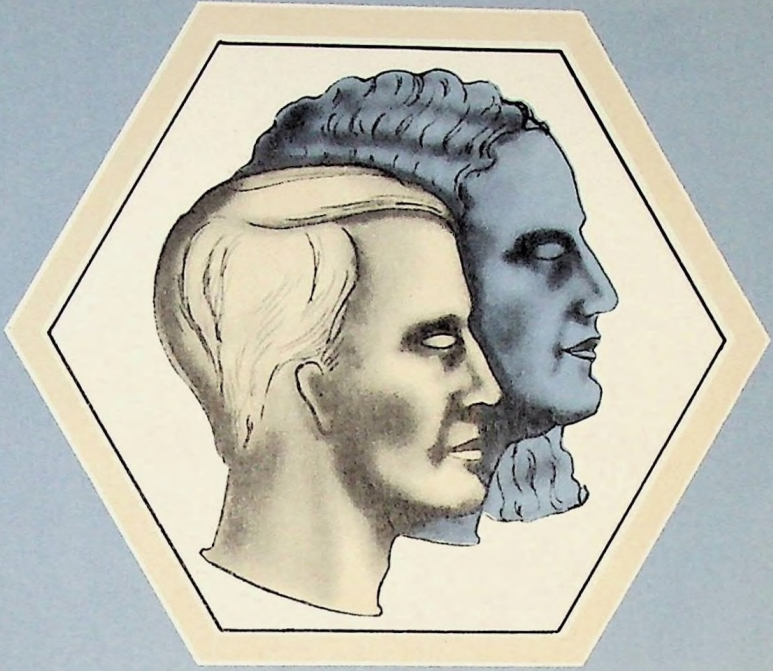

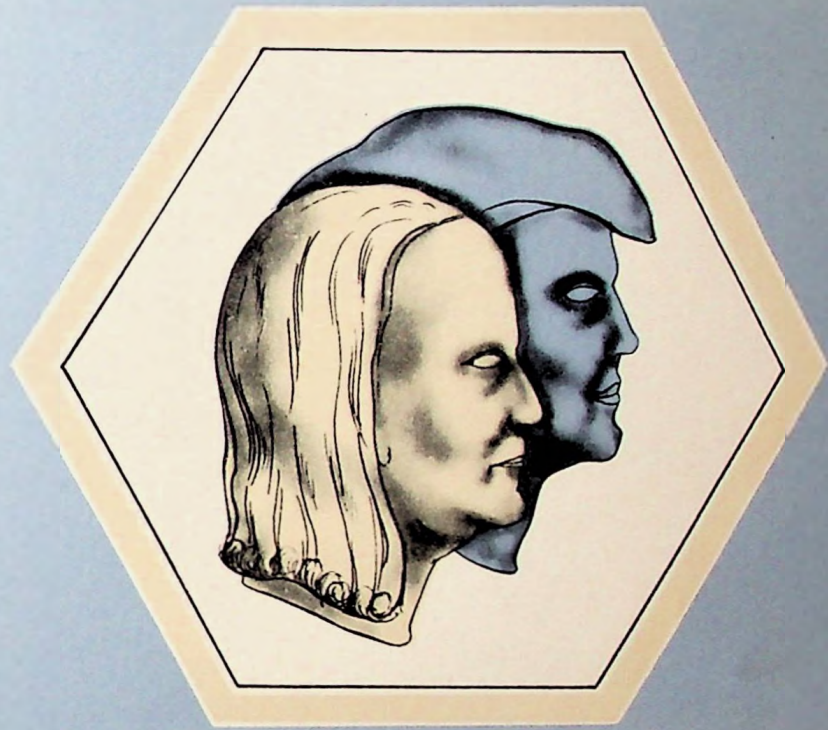
The boys who did well in managing the team were Con Pickett, Robert Laisdell, Rusty Thomas, and Warren Truland.
