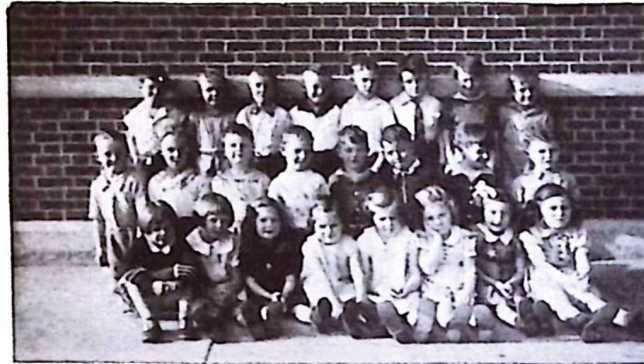


Senior History

During the first three league games, Stillwater beat their opponents with comfortable margins. The remainder of the league season was not quite as favorable as is shown in the score list below:



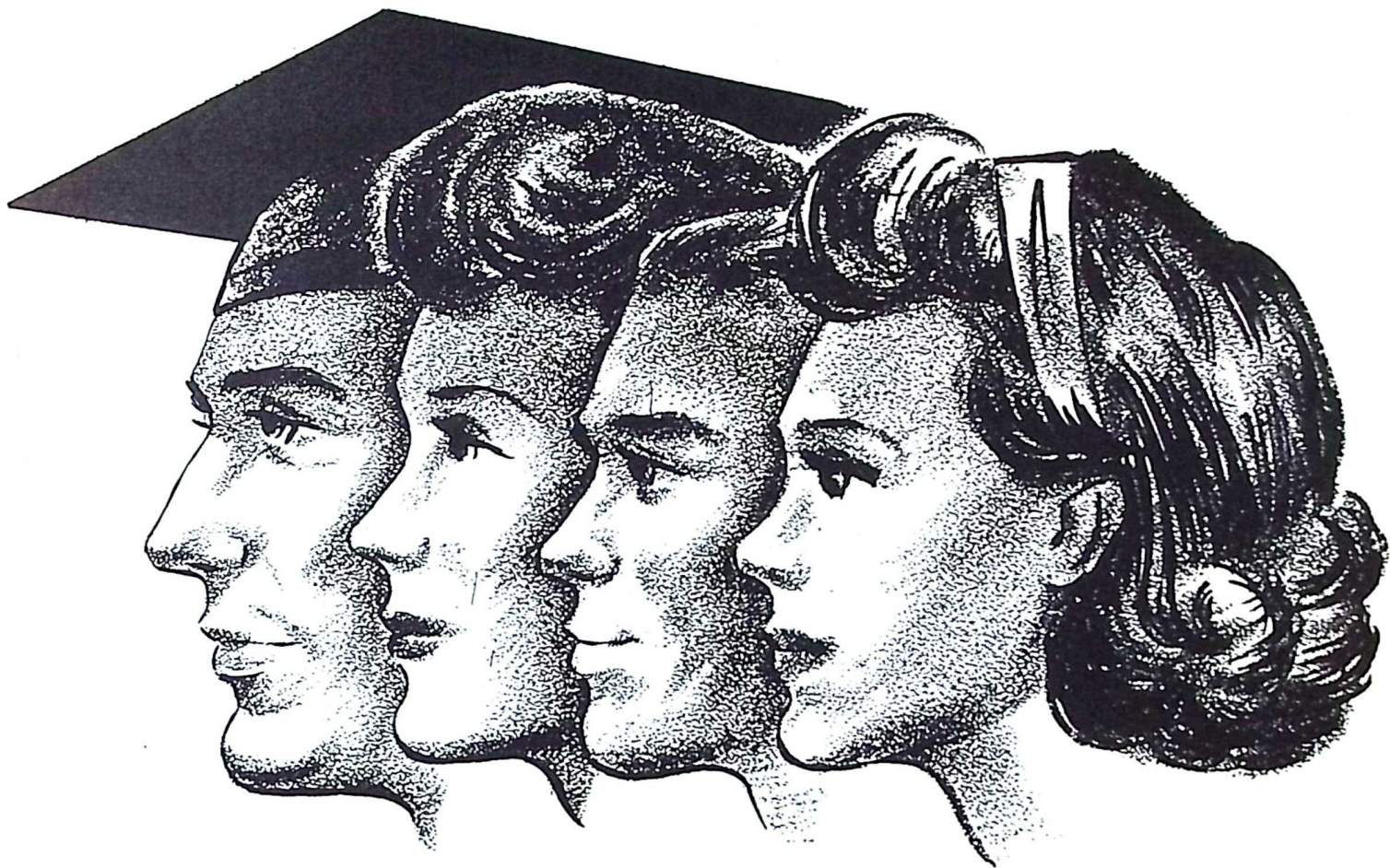
