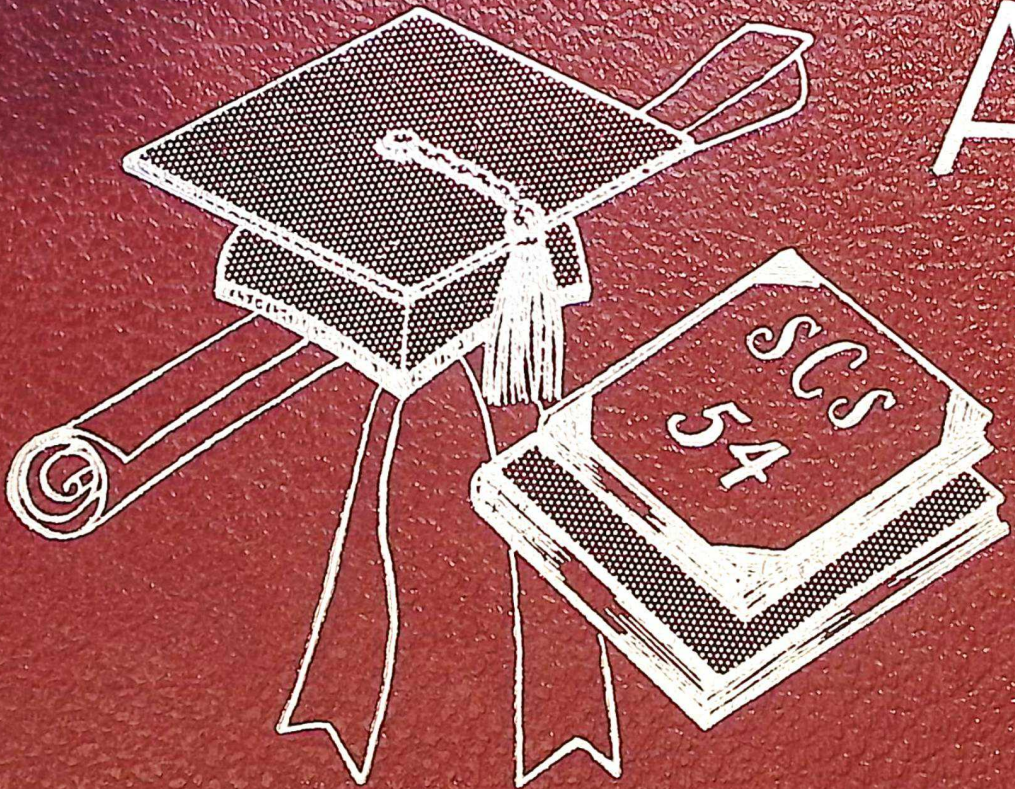
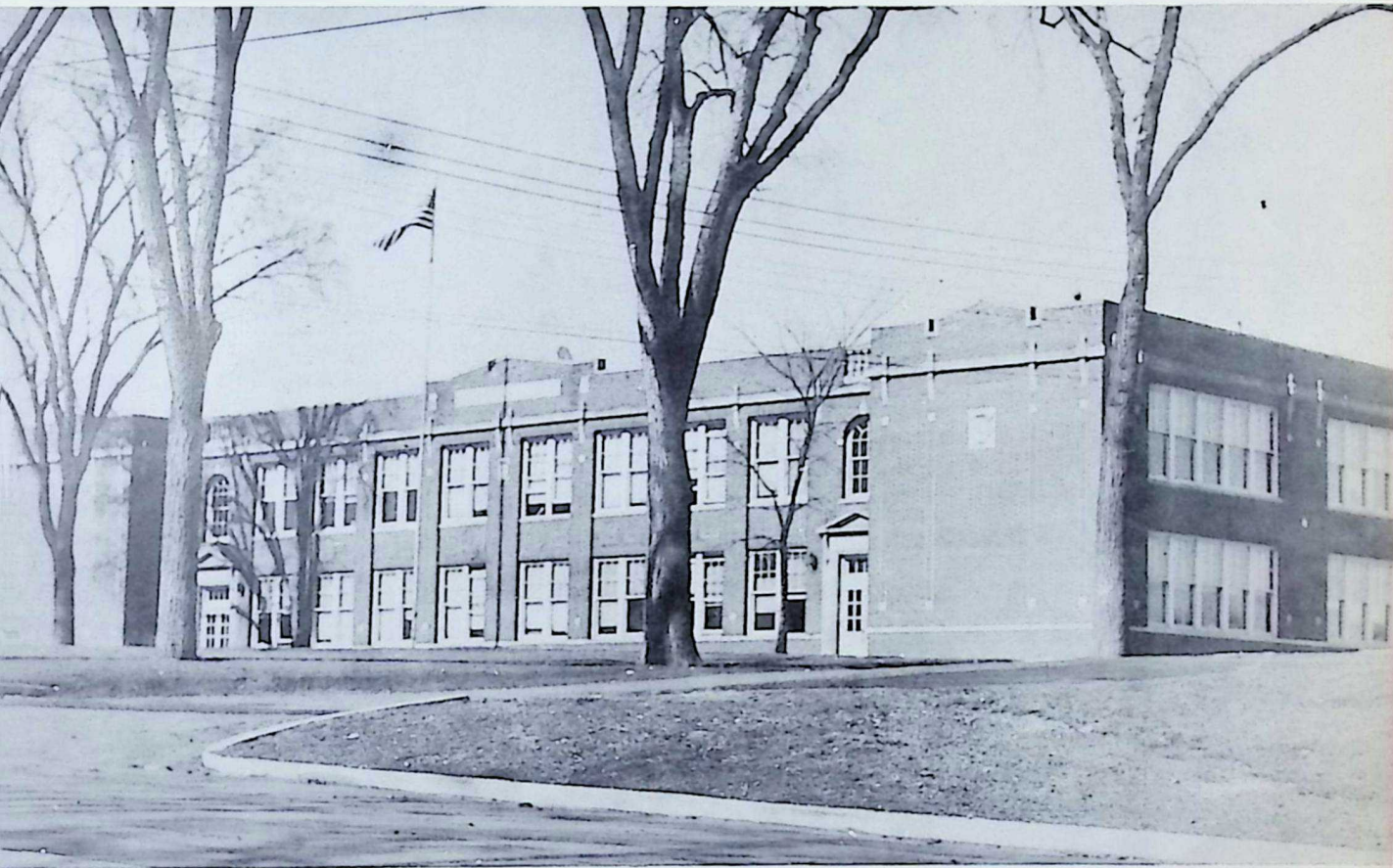

We have learned to respect and admire your untiring efforts in helping each of us become a better person and in so doing help ours become a better school.

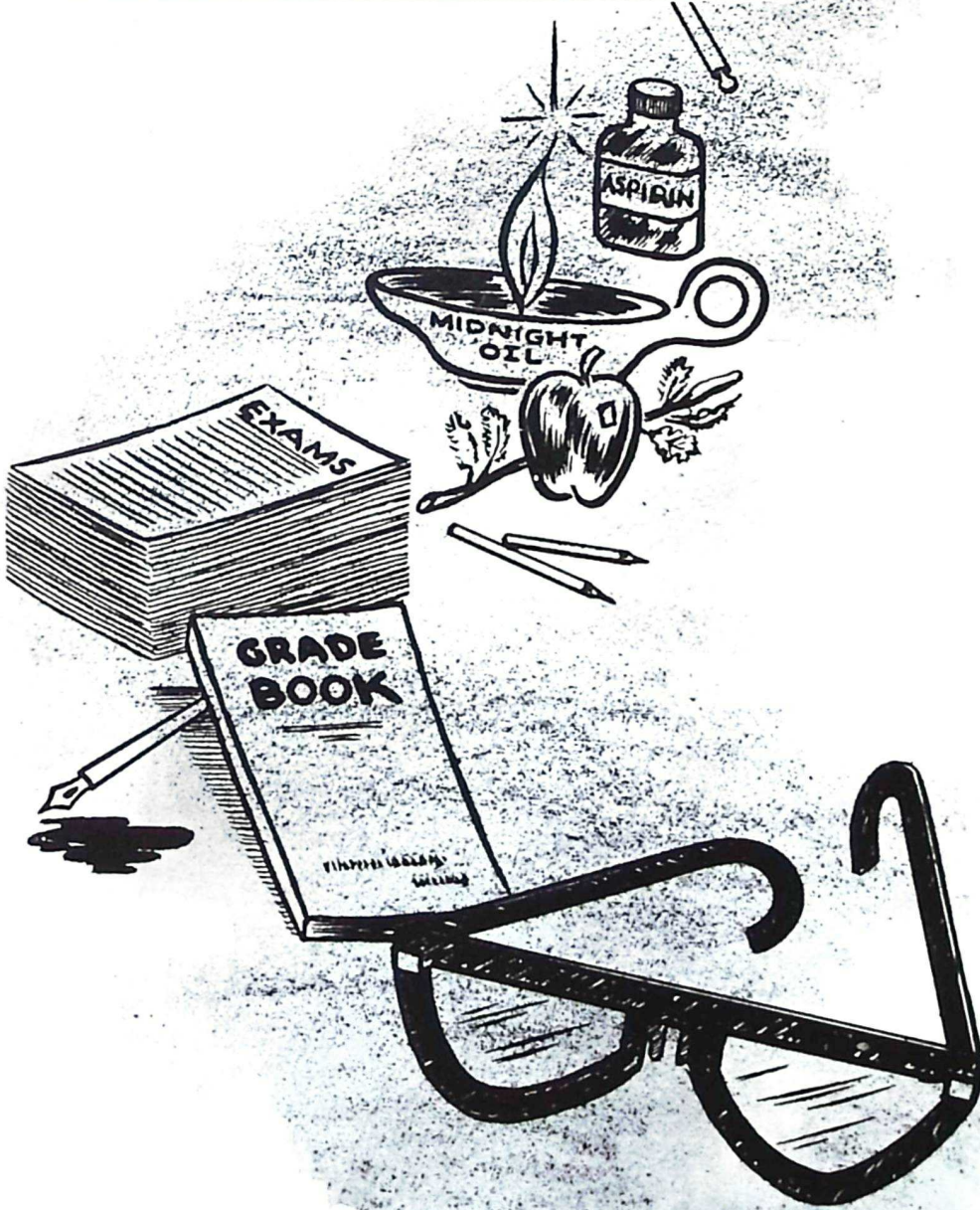
We are grateful for your good judgment and reliable advice. These are only a few of your many qualities and we are pleased that you were with us as long as you were.

Our news would be printed, that, we'd always bet.

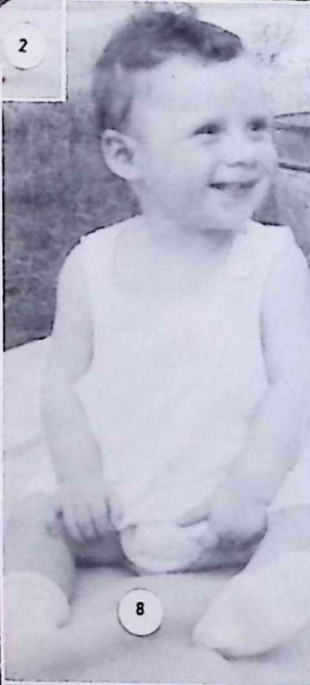
The next in line is **Cecilia Sheffer**.
