Last Will and Testament

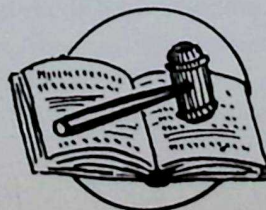

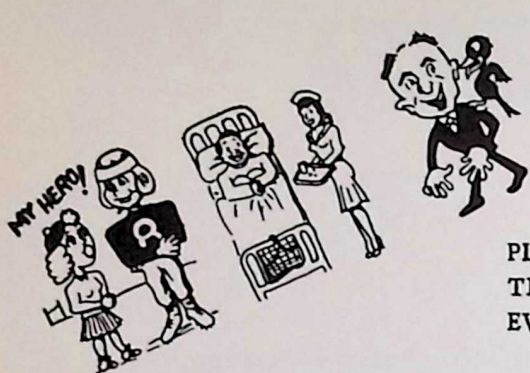
To the Faculty, we give our heartfelt thanks for their assistance through the years.

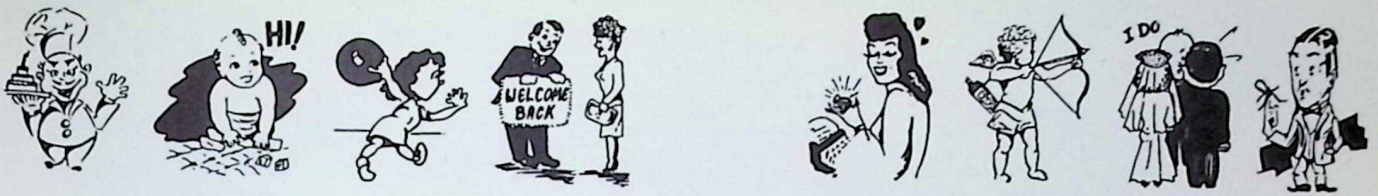
YOU ARE THERE

Basketball

For the first time in fourteen years the Garnet and Gray basketball Warriors of Stillwater Central can proudly claim the championship of the Saratoga County League. Posting a league record of eleven wins and one loss, the charges of coach Julian Le Vine surpassed by far any other team in the league. It is only fair and just that it be stated that Stillwater Central is classified a Class "E" school and furthermore that its competitors represented Class "C" and "D" schools. Its only loss to Burnt Hills was nullified when the Spartans met the Warriors on the home court and the latter emerged victorious.

The starting five, consisting of two seniors, namely Tod Brewer and Roland Wolff, together with a junior, Mike Lilac, and sophomores Tony Armlin and Emmie Dalaba, posted an overall record of sixteen victories while sustaining only two losses. Their loss to Cambridge was almost obliterated from the records as the Warriors launched a victorious offensive when the Indians played a return engagement on the court of SCS. The final score, 103-47, established a new scoring record at Stillwater.

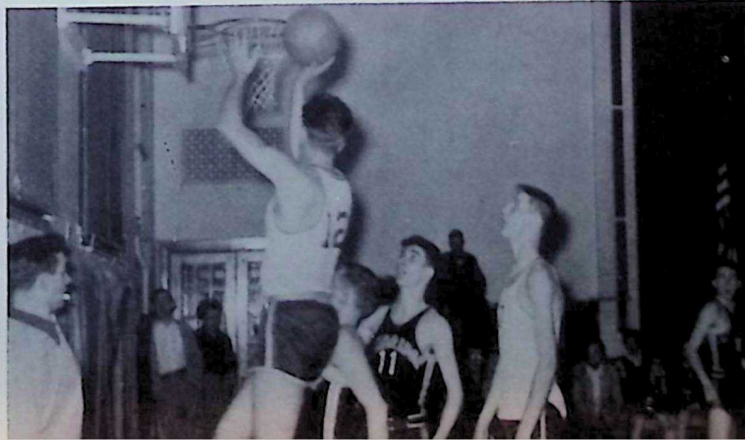
Diminutive, but powered like an atom, Tony Armlin led the boys in the scoring column. He was assisted chiefly by elongated Emmie Dalaba, a 6' 6" determined sophomore who constantly hit the double figures. The senior members of the team, Tod Brewer and Roland Wolff, contributed chiefly with fine board play.

Wolff had his finest night against Corinth, the Warriors' closest rival, as he poured in twenty-one points against the Tomahawks. This 50-48 victory on Corinth's court had a tremendous psychological effect on the boys. Brewer guided the pattern of play throughout the season but was invaluablely aided by Mike Lilac. Mike's twenty-two points in the Warriors' finale against Corinth enabled the Garnet and Gray to gain sole possession of the league championship.
