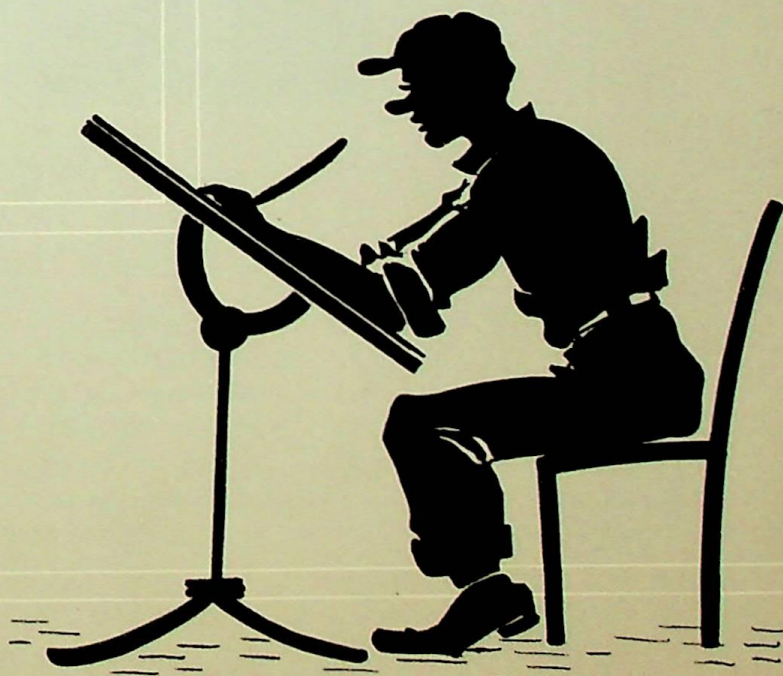
Message From the Co-Editors

Final tests would arrive quickly enough in June. And then - our good-bye to SCS, graduation. Graduation wasn't merely the end of school, it was the door to wider horizons, just the beginning of another and bigger adventure.

I guess Madame Curie has quite a successor; Celia Abel has just introduced a new method of germ prevention that looks VERY good.

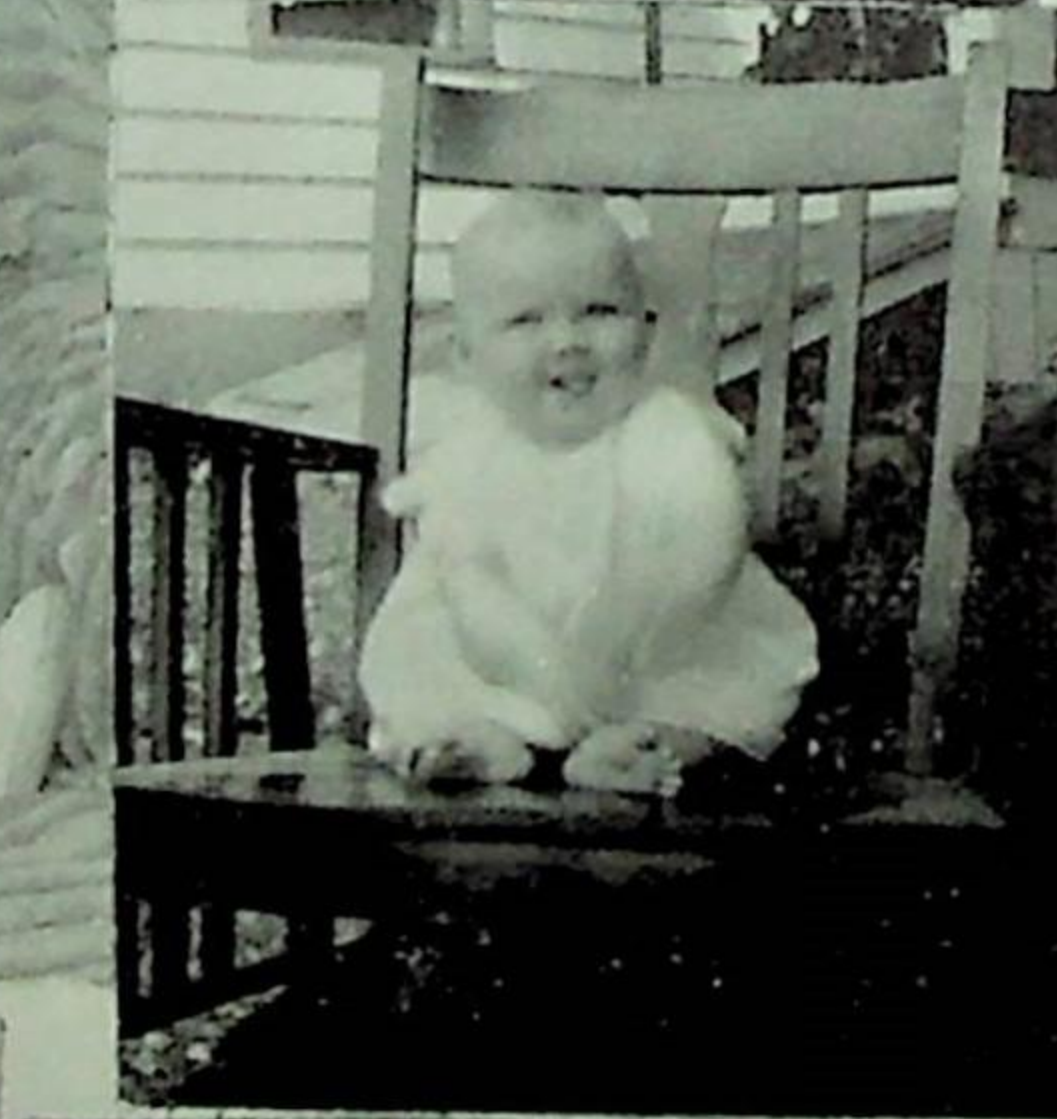

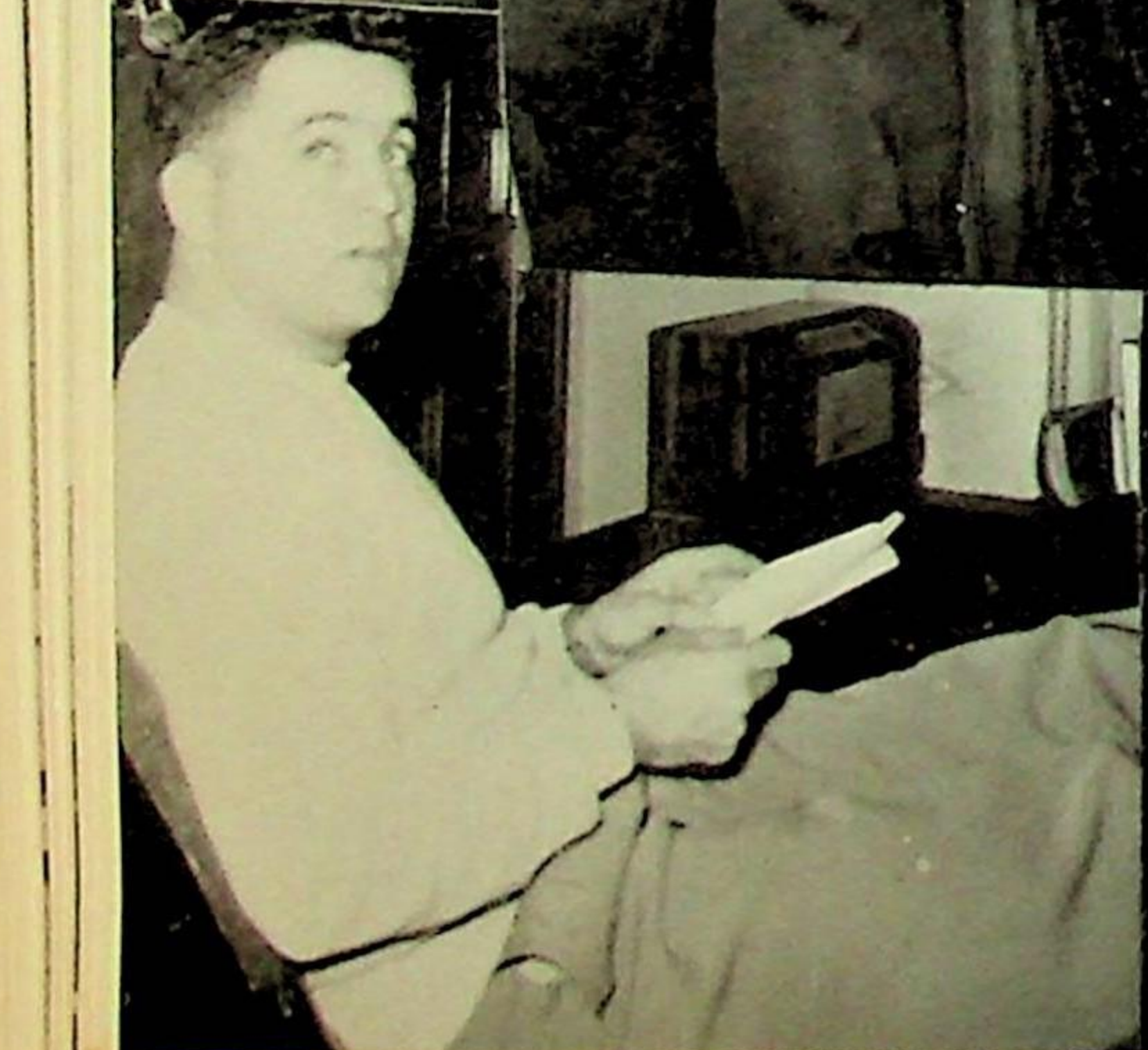
OUR COACH

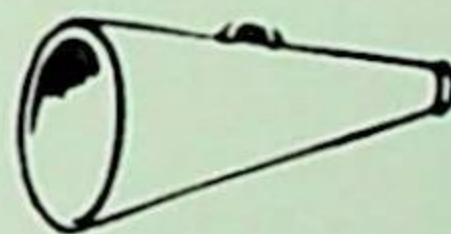
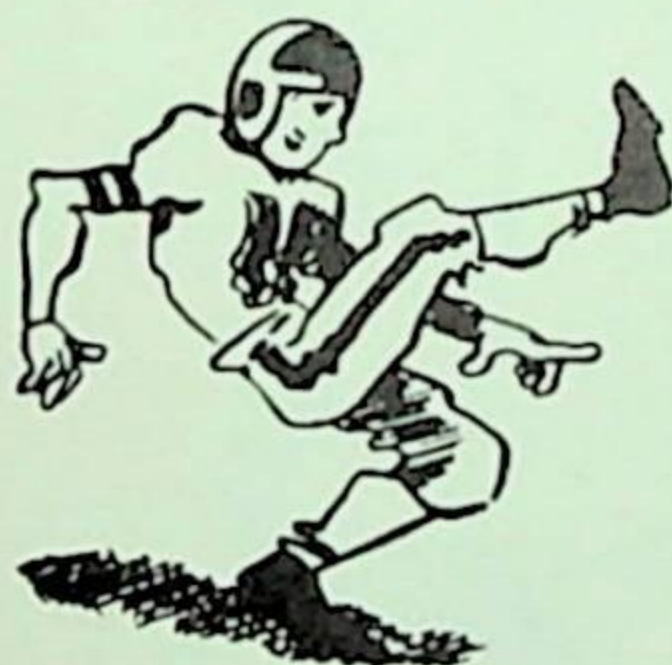
Sports

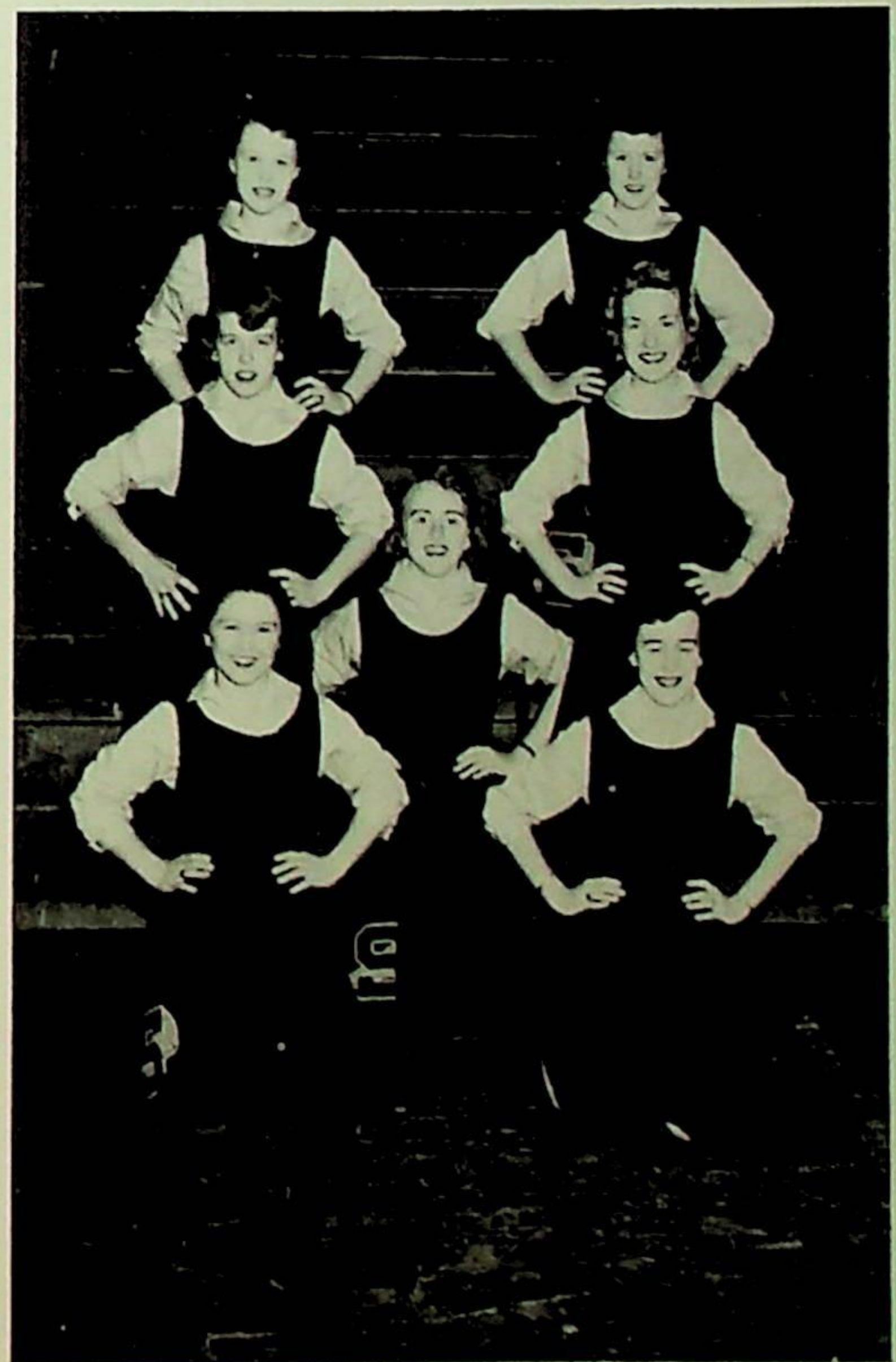

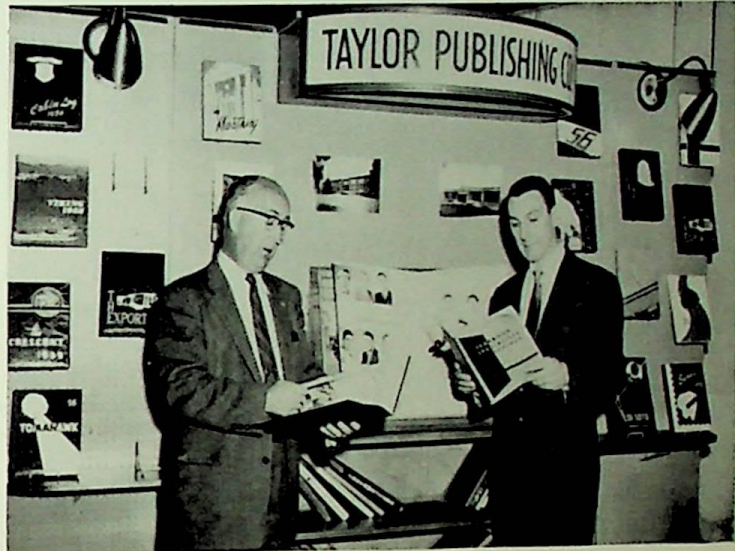

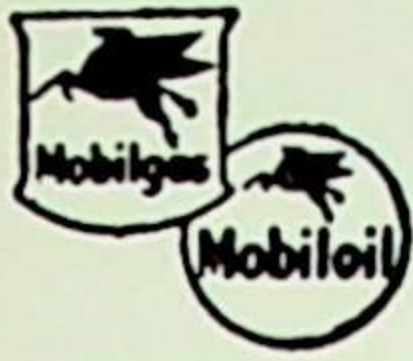
