Class History

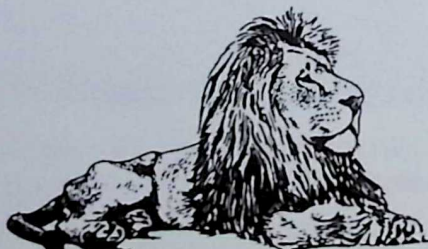

By the looks of things they may go undefeated.

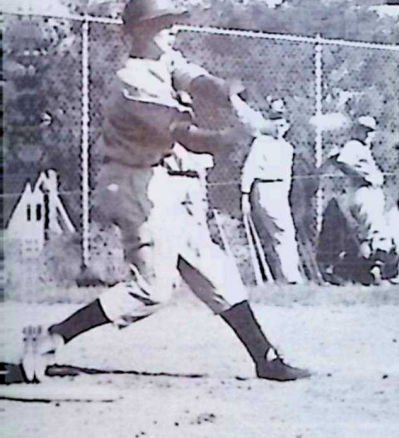

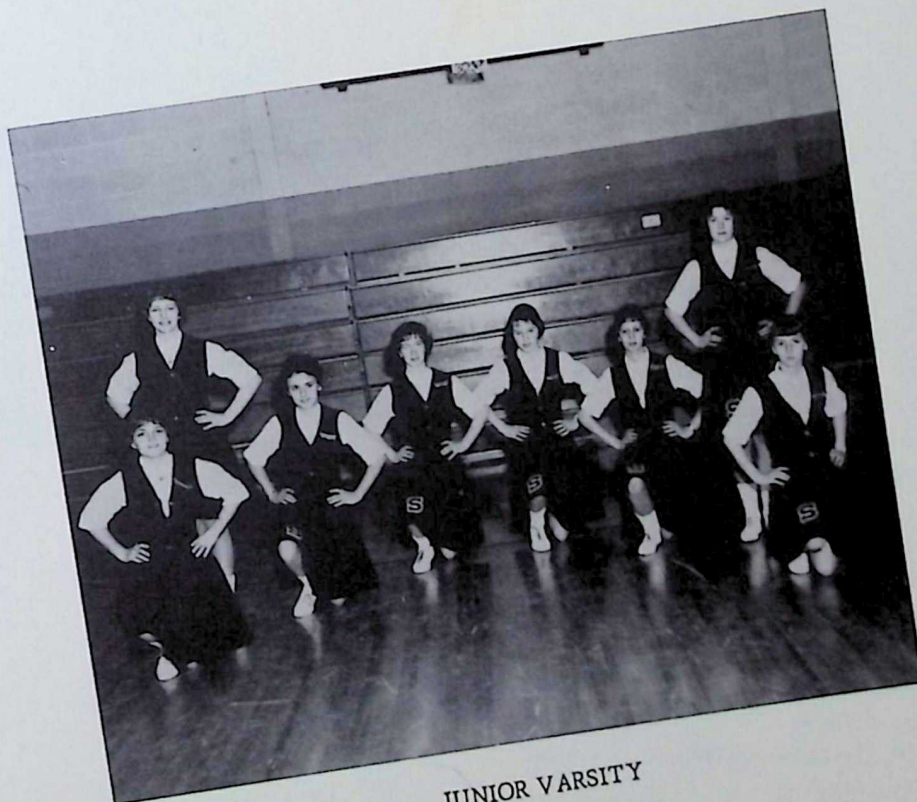

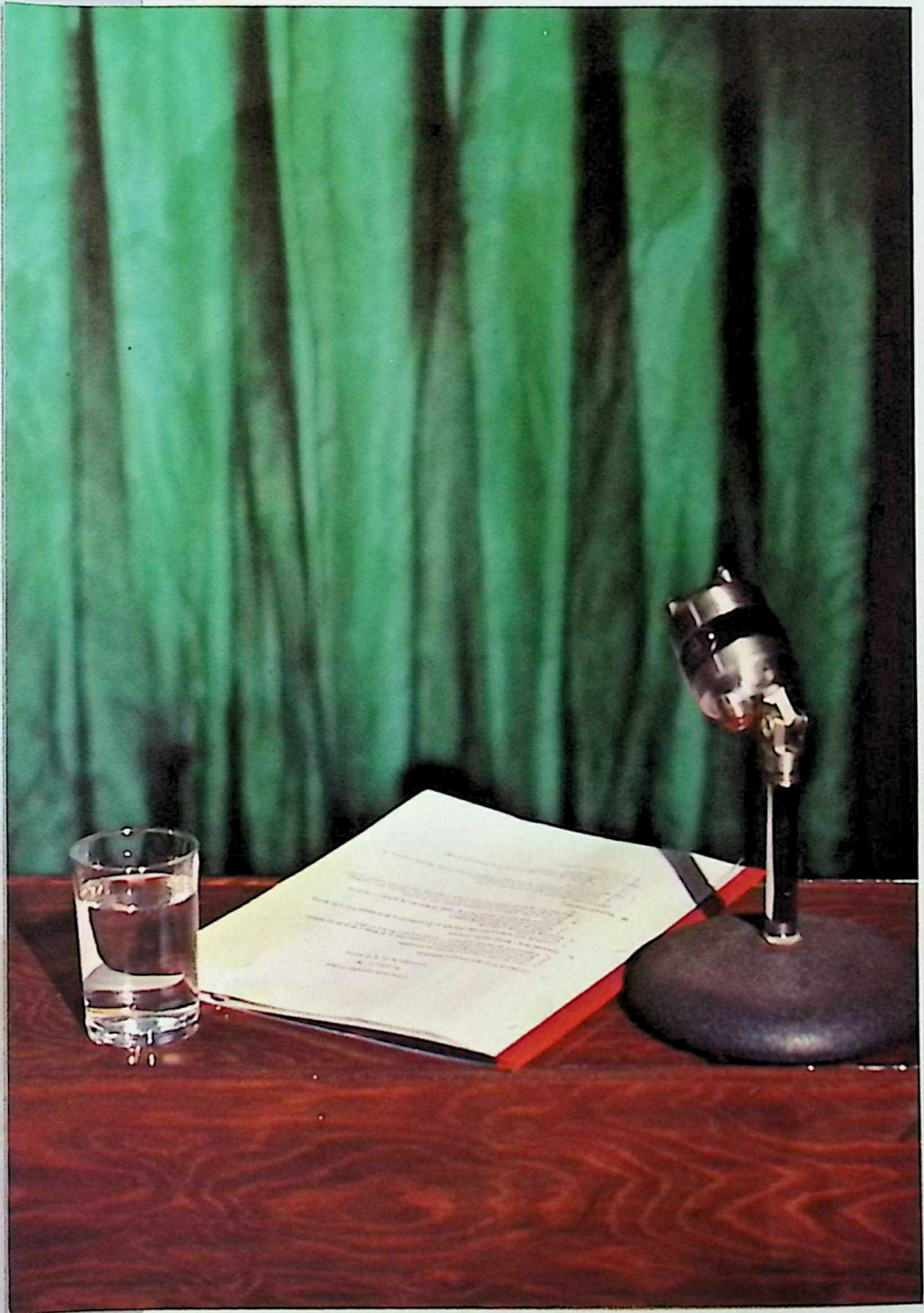

Miss Coons as leading man, and Jerry Petronis was the brother of the Brewster sisters who imagined himself to be Teddy Roosevelt.

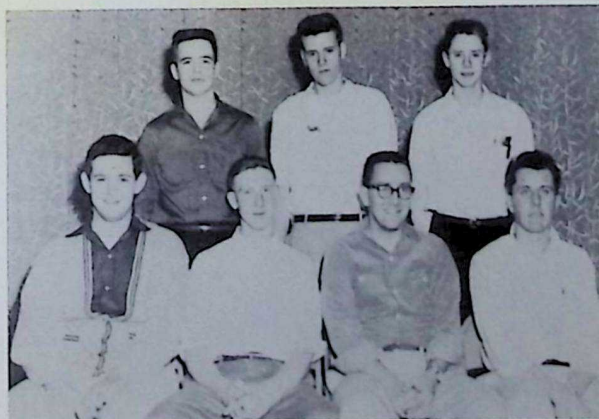

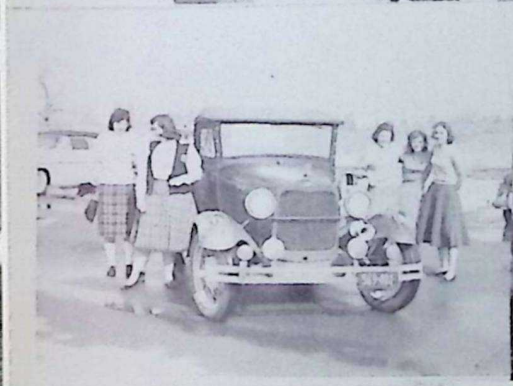
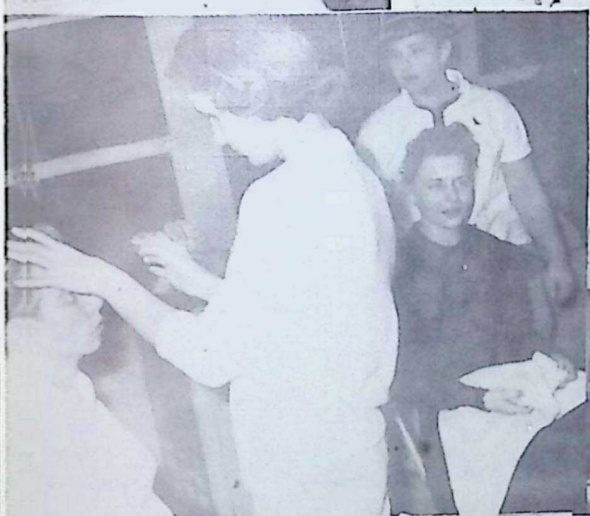
