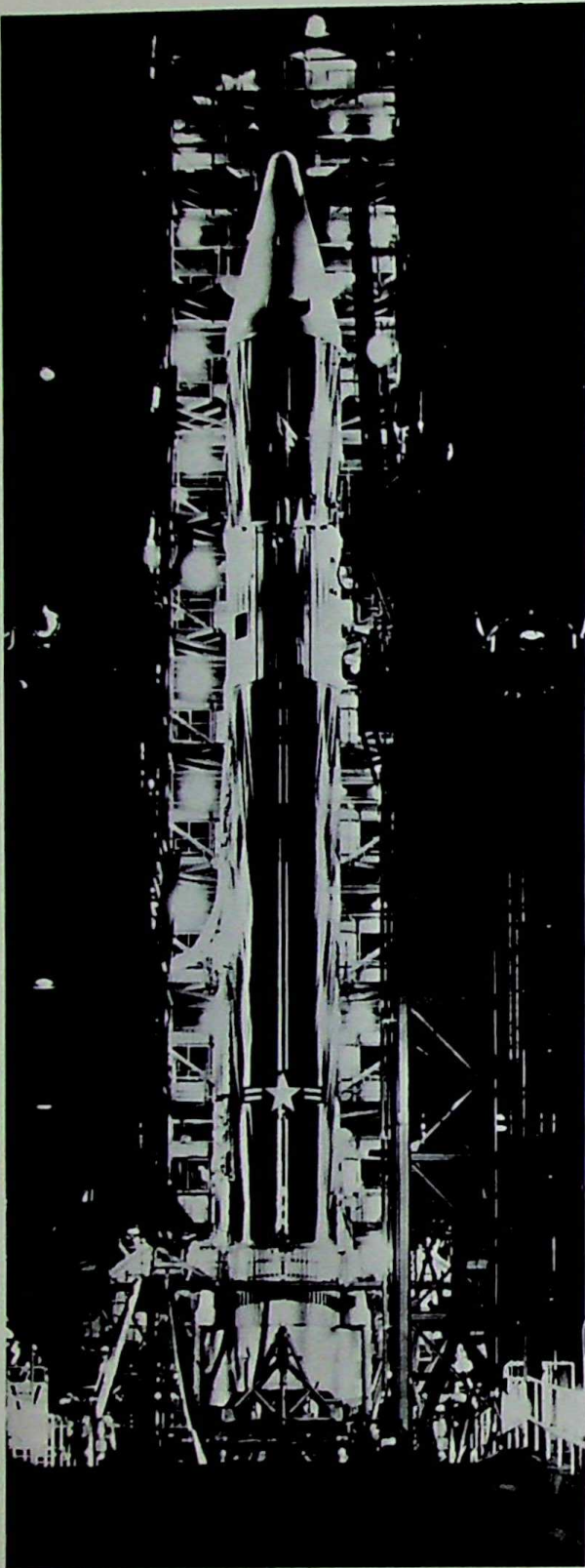


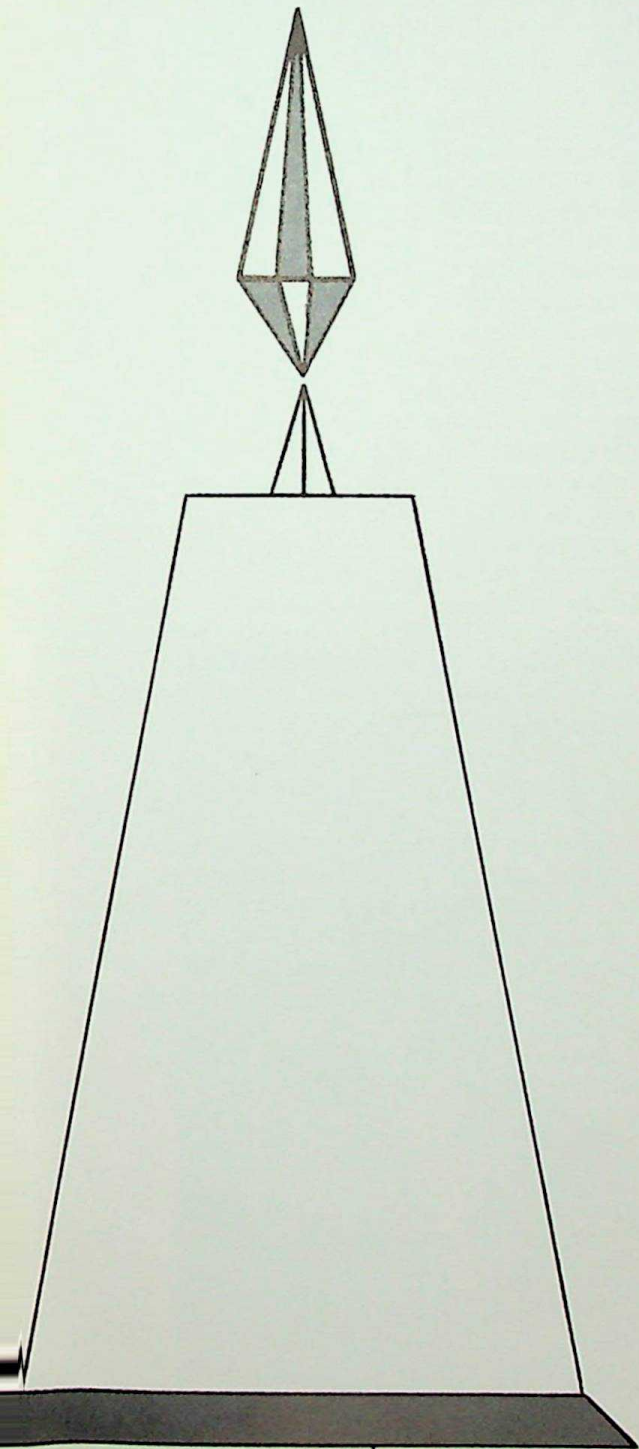

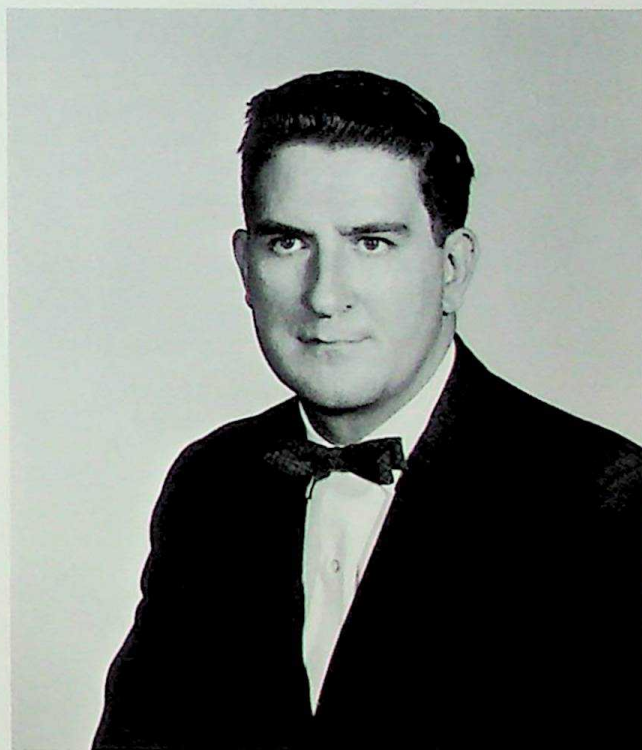
June 24, 1963, is Graduation Day, a very important occasion in your life.

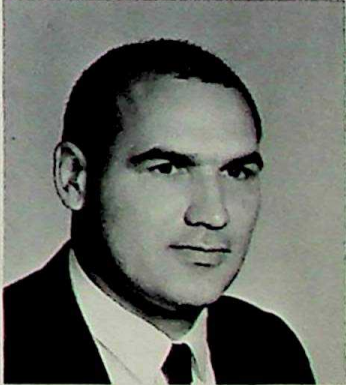

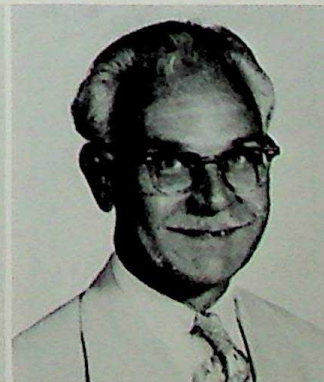

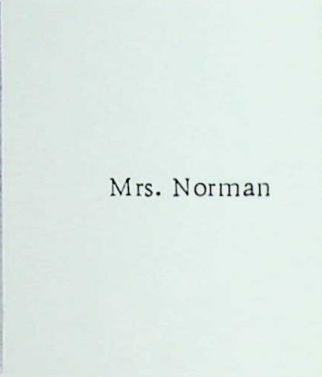

It is June, 1963. The team is assembled on a new and challenging field of combat. Fifty in number, the team is composed of twenty-four girls and twenty-six boys. The goal is success in the Space Age. After one of the toughest games, the players are tired and exhausted. The locker room is a scene of clamor and commotion.

It has been a long, hard-fought, tiring contest but all agree that the first victory is well earned. A review of the game reveals significant highlights.

In September, 1950, when the battle begins, the team is composed of thirteen girls and eleven boys. The goal is a high school diploma -- the elusive trophy. The coaches are their teachers, the referee is the principal, and the cheerleaders and supporters are the parents. After a warm-up session of kindergarten, the coaches feel that the team is ready for action. In the first quarter of the game, in grades one, two, and three, we find teammates spelling their names, recognizing words, and learning to count. By the time the quarter ends, almost every player can put on his own boots with little or no assistance from the coach. On rainy days, cheerleaders are seen splashing about with umbrellas, raincoats and rubbers. They admonish teammates to keep their feet dry.

Grades four, five, and six comprise the second quarter. During this time, Miss Kittle's penmanship drills take up a great deal of time. Multiplication, division, and the eternal struggle with fractions, begins. The coaches keep calling time out for spelling errors. The referee is highly concerned about the number of substitutions and losses.

After much encouragement by the coaches, team spirit appears and is appreciated. Rules of the game are observed but a few reminders and penalties are necessary. Seldom, however, is the referee forced to intervene. At P.T.A. meetings, spectators and cheerleaders continue their avid interest in the game.

The third quarter brings forth grades seven, eight, and nine and a whole new environment. The new Stillwater Central School opens.

The team is the last to struggle for points in the eighth grade regents examinations. Fortunately, members are pleased with the results. The remainder of the quarter is filled with dances, other sports activities, and an introduction to high school classes. For disciplinary reasons, the referee stands near the sideline watching for fouls ever so carefully.

The final quarter steams in quickly but seems very brief. Grades ten, eleven, and twelve determine the final score. French, chemistry, shorthand, and English cause the team members to stay alive and alert. But wait! The referee calls time out for an exciting five days in Washington, D.C. There are other short breaks for such things as the Senior Prom and excursions to local colleges. The coaches hear all kinds of excuses from the team for breaking training. The cheerleaders worry about the budget and worry about late hours the players are keeping. But such is what cheerleaders are for.

Thirteen years of good sportsmanship, regular practice, and hard work are running out. An overtime period is necessary for the awarding of the tantalizing trophies. It is the moment of truth.

The referee distributes the trophies and helps plan for the future of the team. The cheerleaders remember that day thirteen years ago when the game first began. They are sad and glad at one and the same time. And they are infinitely wiser.

The team is excited now that victory is finally here. The players realize that there is a greater, more important game to come. As they leave, trophies in hand, they not only realize that the Space Age is a great gridiron where the battle of life and death is to be fought, but also is one where the spoils of success are there for the asking. For these players the day is nigh.

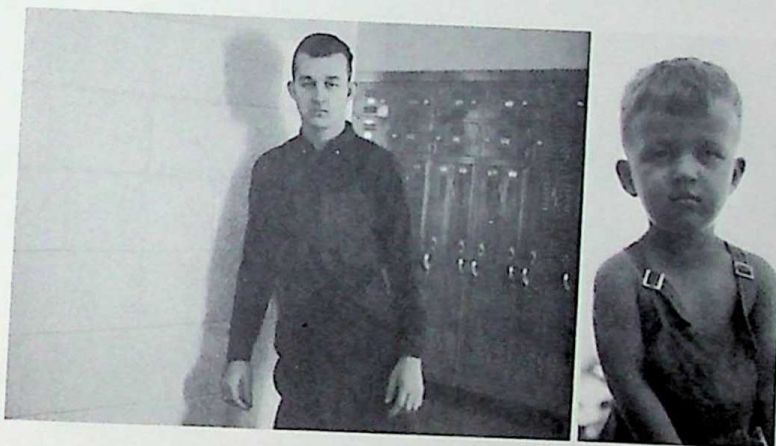
Sue is shown helping with the yearbook as efficiently as we hope she will with her future patients. Actually she's hiding from Miss Rich.



Ron is shown demonstrating the correct passing procedure. In five years, when Ron is Stillwater's football coach, the passing procedure will come in handy.



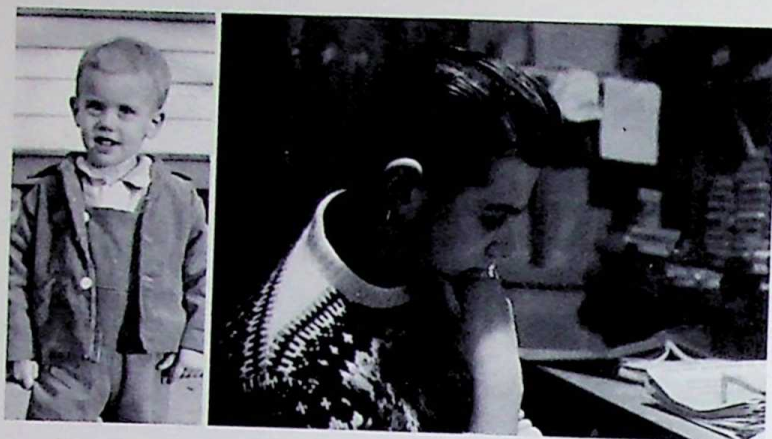
Paul -- is shown among recruits demonstrating his convincing arguments in favor of the Navy. Actually he is attempting to free his stuck hand from his pocket.

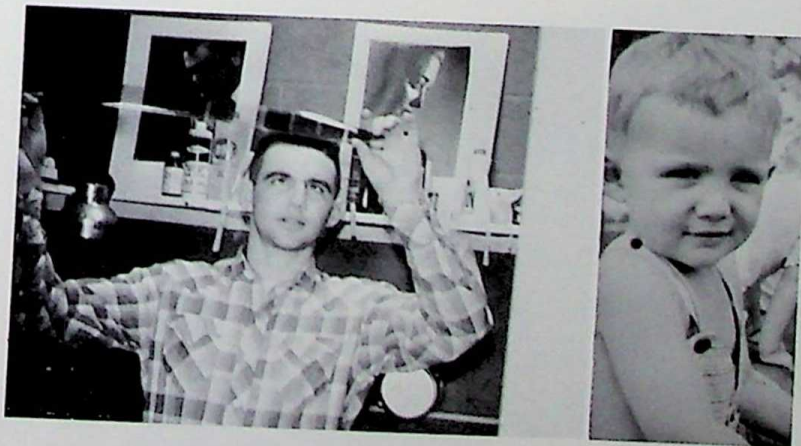
Flintstone looks like she is recording yearbook information, BUT she's really looking at pictures so she can write up her book report. After graduation, she intends to study merchandizing.

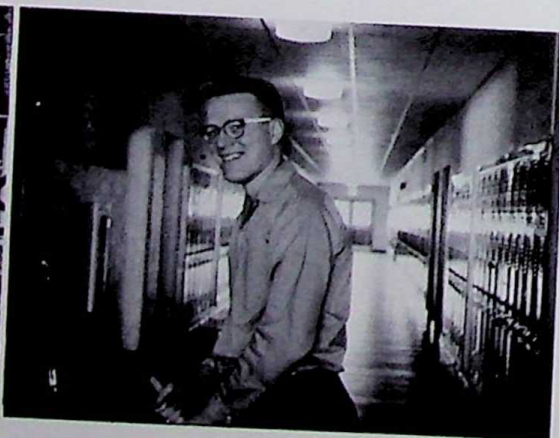

Diana has just discovered a new and more comfortable typing position. This she will use when she, as a typist, hits one hundred words per minute. (She's really our vintage sampler.)



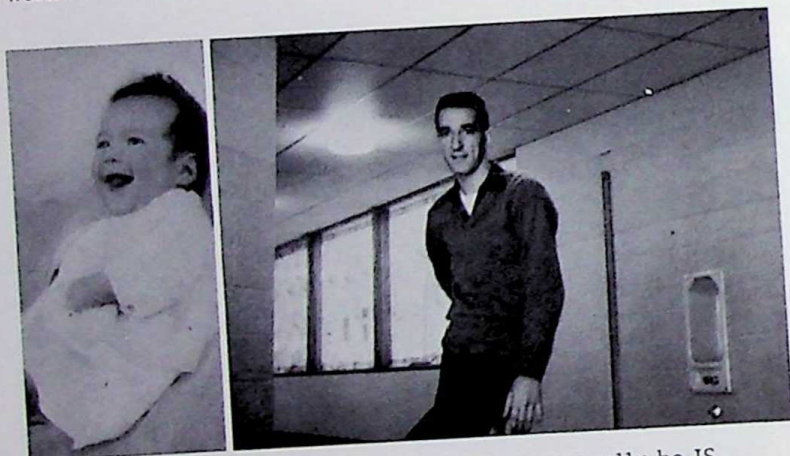

Sam is shown sliding down a banister. Actually he IS sliding down a banister. Sam plans to eventually own a garage and be his own mechanic.



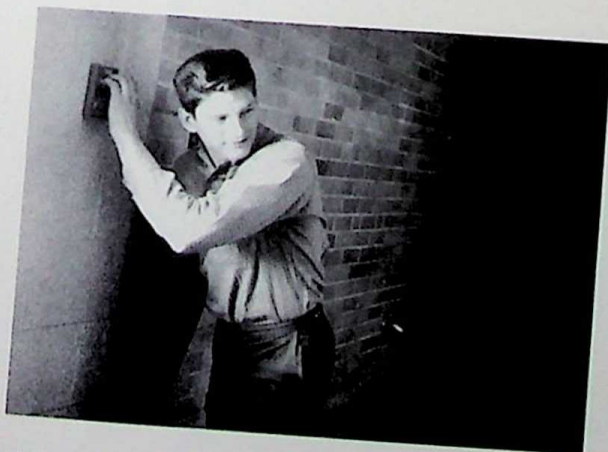

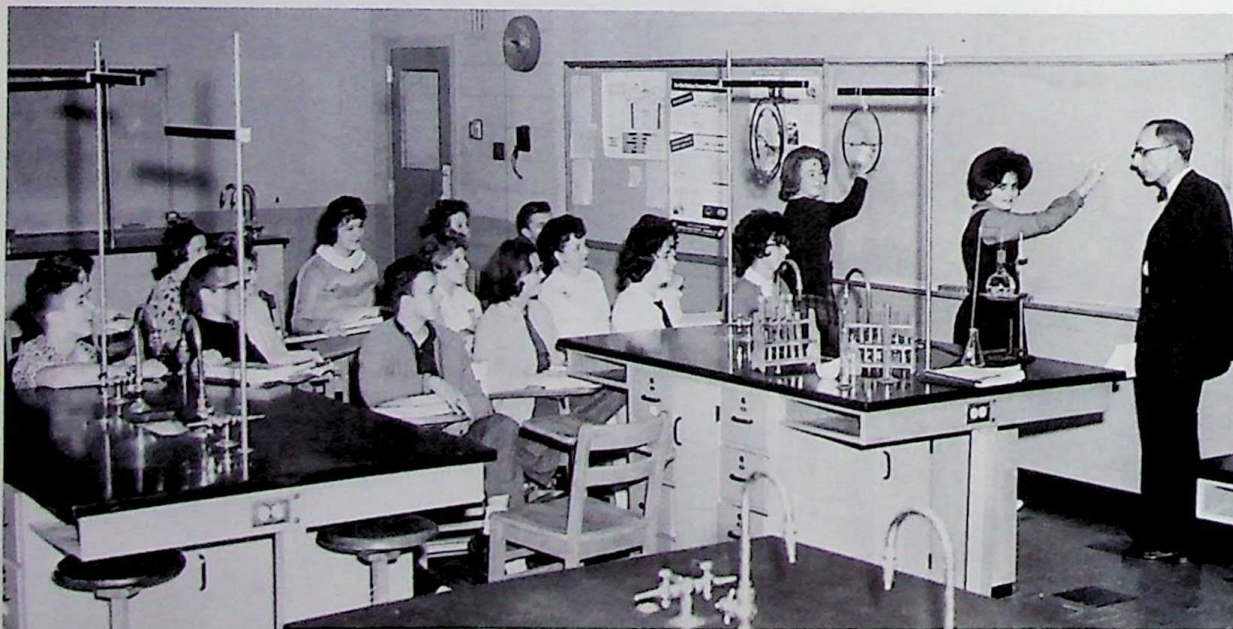


Math

Science



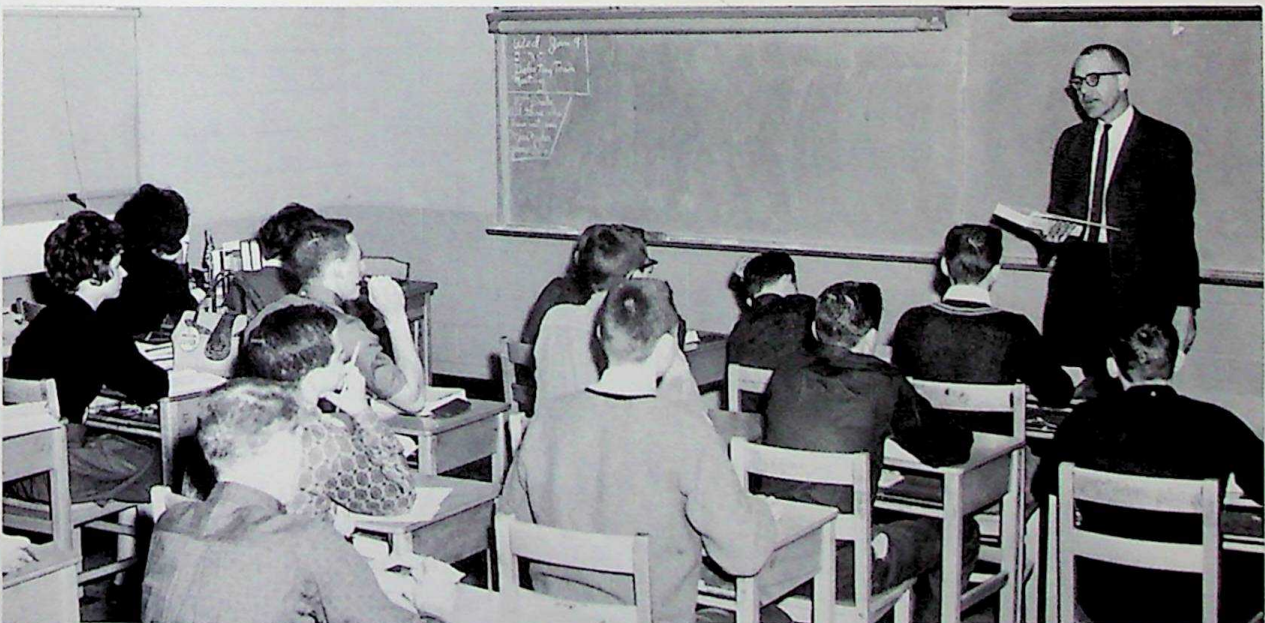
